

Johnny Majors Among Team Announced for Senior Bowl

Mobile, Ala. — (U.P.) — Headed by John Drum Majors of Tennessee and Baylor, Bill Glass, 25 football stars have accepted invitations to play in the eighth annual senior bowl classic, scheduled for Ladd Stadium Jan. 5.

The squad announced Saturday includes 16 players rating some type of All-America recognition and lists 12 of the first 49 players named in pro football's "early" draft.

Slated to oppose a similar aggregation from the North, to be announced next week, the South team has 12 Southeastern Conference representatives, five players from the Southwest Conference, three from the Atlantic Coast, two from the Big Seven, and three from top independents.

Majors was picked as the nation's outstanding back by United Press and finished a close second in balloting for the Heisman Trophy. Others halfbacks are George Wells of Clemson, George Volkert of Georgia Tech, Eddie Sutton of North Carolina, Jim Harris of Oklahoma, and Jackie Simpson of Florida.

Defending the T-offense will be Charlie Curtis of Texas Christian and Wade Mitchell of Georgia Tech.

Two of the nation's top fullbacks — Don Bosseler of Miami and Jack Pardee of Texas A&M — will give the Rebels a potent middle attack.

The rest of the roster: Ends: Buddy Cruise, Tennessee; Ron Bennett, Mississippi State; Jack Johnson, Miami; Roy Wilkins, Georgia; and Ed Gray, Oklahoma. Tackles: Don Owens, Mississippi Southern; John Gordy, Tennessee.

NY Giants Expected to Cinch Toga

The New York Giants are favored to win the National Football league's Eastern division title today by defeating the Cleveland Browns, ending the Browns' title string at a record six straight years.

New York leads the Chicago Cardinals by 1½ games and is an 11-point choice to win the title for the first time since 1946. Cleveland, eliminated from a division title tussle for the first time since it was organized 11 years ago, never has before been rated such a rank underdog.

Actually, the Giants (7-2-1) need only a tie to clinch the crown.

The Detroit Lions also are 11-point favorites to whip the Pittsburgh Steelers at Briggs Stadium and hold their narrow, half-game margin over the Chicago Bears in the Western race. The Bears are 10-point picks to keep close on Detroit's heels by defeating the Cardinals at Wrigley Field.

The Washington Redskins, who could win the Eastern title by sweeping their three remaining games providing New York loses its last two, are 7½ point favorites to defeat the visiting Philadelphia Eagles.

In Sunday's other game, the Los Angeles Rams entertain Baltimore and try to get even for a 56-21 whipping they took from the Colts two weeks ago. All five games will be televised regionally.

San Francisco — (U.P.) — That Broadway ditty, "Shuffle Off to Buffalo," is being given the reverse treatment today by Joey Giambro, the handsome middleweight who plans to forsake his hometown for San Francisco and bigger loot.

"Let's face it, boxing is strictly dollars and cents and I think I can do better on the west coast than around home," Giambro said on the eve of Monday's rematch with Rocky Castellani. "Sure, I get \$4,000 for every televised bout I fight plus a percentage of the gate. But where is the gate? Nobody comes out any more to TV fights."

Joey figures that a name fighter here can do better than on the East coast, whether the fight is televised or not. So he is preparing to sell his home in Buffalo next January and use the money to build one out here.

Mike Scanlan, Joey's manager, also figures to move out here with his number one meal ticket.

The outspoken Giambro concedes that he has a key plan—to pick up the discarded hero's mantle which was worn for three years by former world middleweight champion Bobo Olson. Bobo was everybody's local hero until he ran into a knockout by Archie Moore and two by Ray Robinson. He now is retired.

Texas Nips Oregon State; Portlanders Drub U of O

Corvallis — (U.P.) — Texas came from behind to nip Oregon State, 64-63, in the thrilling nightcap of a basketball double-header here Friday night.

In the opener, a classy University of Portland team laced Oregon, 79-46.

A crowd of 5100 saw the Texas Longhorns overcome a 35-31 Oregon State halftime lead with six minutes gone in the second half and move into a 40-40 tie.

From then on it was touch and go with no more than three points separating the teams, but with Texas in front most of the time.

The Longhorns moved into a 54-53 lead on a field goal by guard Kenneth Cleveland with 5½ minutes left to play. The Longhorns never were behind from then on, although the Beavers had a chance to tie the score in the final 15 seconds when sophomore Lee Harman was fouled. But Harman's free throw fell short and with it went Oregon State's hopes.

Dave Gambee, Oregon State forward, was high scorer with 24 points. Forward Raymond Downs was high for Texas with 16.

In the first game, the Portland Pilots displayed too much speed and finesse for the hapless Ducks. Coach Al Negretti's charges ran up a 37-20 halftime

fray. Guard Jack Scrivens of Portland was high scorer with 17 points, followed closely by teammate Gene Kutsch with 15. Most any Oregon player could get was 8 by sophomore Bud Kuykendall.
