A Nickel's Worth of Comment On This and That

Washington (U.P.)—This is a never told story.

It is a well-known fact that Franklin D. Roosevelt was a collector of stamps as a kid and through his years as assistant secretary of the Navy, governor of New York and President of the United States.

But came the pressure of global war, and trivia like collecting things seemed unimportant.

Then about 1945, our former leader wasn't feeling so good. An aide suggested that the chief might get his mind off his aches and pains if he would turn back to his old hobby—stamp collecting.

That's where the hero of this piece comes in. He is Charles Kohlen, who operates a "hobby shop" here. He heard about the President's problem. The need to fill out an old album was a couple of old stamps from the English colonies.

One was a British Honduras stamp, a six-center issued in 1887. The other was one which went off the hand press worth a single shilling in 1882.

Kohlen went to work. He found both of them and presented his card at the White House.

According to "hobby-shopper" Kohlen, the lovable leader of the

world at the time clobbered the little dealer on the back and said:

"Gad what a memory. You have found them."

Kohlen, a business man with considerable experience in dealing with the high and mighty, said he wanted \$28 cash—"no checks."

The gentleman from Hyde Park, according to Charles Kohlen, searched his jeans and had not a cent with him.

Charlie said the President offered to sign a note.

"No," said Charlie with sparkle in eye.

But he left the stamps anyway. Whether he ever got paid is Kohlen's own secret.

Complete Collection

The complete collection of the stamps of the period is in the hands of the Roosevelt family.

Charlie, who set up shop about 1920, also recalls an earlier customer.

"One day," he said, "right after I set up shop, Henry Ford came in. I didn't know the guy, but he said he was interested in coins. American ones. I finally sold him some, but I lost money on the deal. I asked for \$81, and he offered me \$75 and I took it."

A lot of presidents have come into the little hole in the wall place. Woodrow Wilson was a frequent visitor. President Warren G. Harding collected tie-pins.

Harry S. Truman created quite a stir when he dropped in to buy a picture.

The Family Council

The Family Council does not give advice; it merely reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Lucy D. — I want to go back to Gary.

John D. — She can't be happy with him.

Lucy D. — Four years ago, when I was 25, I had an unhappy love affair. I was very much in love with Gary and I know he was with me, but he said he just wasn't ready to get married, he wasn't economically able to support a wife and family and he wasn't really sure of what he wanted.

We had an affair that lasted for about a year. It was quite unhappy. We fought most of the time. Finally, we split up and I got married. I told my husband and he forgave me.

We have been married two years and are not very happy. I have not been able to forget Gary. Recently I met him and he said he now realizes he had made a mistake and wants to marry me. My husband once agreed to give me a divorce if I could not be happy with him, but he is now backing out of the bargain.

John D. — I have met this Gary my wife is so crazy about and he strikes me as just a good-for-nothing — the type of men who can't stand to see any woman get away from him.

If he marries Lucy, I'm sure they'll be just as unhappy as they were before. He still can't afford a wife and family and I doubt whether he'll ever be economically on his feet.

I would be willing to go through with the bargain and give my wife a divorce if I thought she was doing the right thing with her life. Lucy told me when we got married that she wasn't sure she loved me. I told her I would try to make her happy. I realize I haven't succeeded, but I want to try again because I feel so sure she would be making a mistake to marry Gary.

The Council's John's selfishness appears to exceed all reasonable bounds. Both he and Lucy are all wrought up over Lucy's "happiness." Lucy complains that she and John have not been happy — but then, neither was she happy with Gary. John humbly regrets that he has not "made Lucy happy."

He explores the possibility of her being "happy" with Gary and finds little hope there.

But what about John's happiness? He made no demand on Lucy to make him happy when they married and makes no demands on his own behalf now.

Neither one of these two parties believes that Lucy owes any responsibility to John.

John made a mistake to marry on the false basis that he would grant his wife a divorce if he could not make her happy and he is now stating the wrong reason for refusing the divorce.

He has a right, if he loves his wife, to demand that she make a whole-hearted attempt to make a success of their marriage.

Lucy may not be ready to accede to this demand, but she should know that if she doesn't, she is following a course that will bring her little "happiness."

She was wrong and foolish to enter into the affair with Gary and she was still more foolish to marry a man she believed she didn't love. Her self-seeking, her riding roughshod over law, morality, the feelings of others will bring her to disaster. She must learn to stand by her decisions and contribute something to make them a success.
