John Day — (U.P.) — Mrs. Helen Shaughnessy, a 39-year-old Eskimo woman from Portland was fatally injured by a pistol bullet early yesterday while on a hunting excursion with two Portland men.

John Day Police Chief William Metteer said the woman was shot at a John Day auto court Saturday morning while she and Elmer Whitlow and John Wagner, both of Portland, were preparing to go hunting.

Wagner said his pistol discharged while he was loading it. The bullet struck Mrs. Shaughnessy in the lower left side and she died within a few minutes.

Authorities said Mrs. Shaughnessy had been employed by Whitlow for about 11 years. She was a divorcee and had no known survivors.
