But for the time being, all 46 are being given tight protection by Australian federal security agents. The 46, and three others who have not yet decided whether they will go back to Hungary, were staying either in the Olympic Village or with Australian friends. In either case, officials said they would be given protection until the Russian Olympic ship Gruzia sails from the harbor. Use of Christmas Seal Income Told at Meet

"Approximately 85 per cent of Christmas seal income is spent on direct tuberculosis control," Eugene Thorndike, president, stated at the monthly board of directors meeting of the Jackson County Public Health association. The remaining 15 per cent is spent on tuberculosis prevention or the maintaining of high public health standards, he said. Recently, the association has been criticized by people who do not understand TB control, about the way this 15 per cent of our income is spent. Thorndike pointed out. Possibly as a result, returns from the annual Christmas seal sale are off considerably this year from previous years. Program Explained "Should our basic TB program, so important to the residents of Jackson county, suffer because of these subsidiary activities?" he asked. "Either TB is attacked on all levels by the Christmas seal money, or TB runs rampant in the community. The public health association will carry on in all events, but its services to the public will necessarily be curtailed in the event of a reduced income. If that comes to pass, the taxpayers will be forced to pick up the tab for the difference. The only part of our program being criticized is the 15c out of every dollar spent on TB prevention or a general health program. I am sure the association would be glad to refund 15c out of every dollar to those who feel that high standards of public health are not important to the prevention of TB," he added. Old Philosophy For the past 30-odd years, the Jackson County Public Health association has been operating on the philosophy that good general health is the first bulwark in TB prevention. Mrs. Lewis Ulrich reported. Mrs. Ulrich, a board member of many years standing, said TB control is divided into three phases — case finding, treatment, and enhancing resistance of the human body to the tubercle bacillus. This basic approach to TB is recognized and sponsored by national and state TB associations.

Fire Destroys Family Home

Fire originating in a chimney flue destroyed the Stanley Pardee residence, route 1, box 412-A, Medford, about 7:15 a.m. Saturday, Mrs. Pardee reported today. She said she, her husband and two children were asleep when the fire started. Pardee awakened first and discovered the ceiling was burning.
