Steel Firm Starts Big Health Center

Pittsburgh—(U.P.)—A "positive approach to maintain the employee in health" underlies the plans of the nation's second largest steel-maker for its \$400,000 health center.

Construction has started here on the Jones & Laughlin Steel Corp. health center which will serve the 12,000 employees of the firm's Pittsburgh works.

The one-story building of steel and glass will house a suite for first aid treatment, facilities for physiotherapy and rehabilitation, an emergency operating suite, X-ray equipment, private consultation and examination rooms, a laboratory, an electro-cardiogram room, nurses' quarters, a library, and a conference room.

Adm. Ben Moreell, chairman of the J. & L. board, said:
"We regard our program as one of preventive medicine which

cooperates with constructive public health activities."

The corporation's medical director, Dr. D. J. Lauer, put it this way:

"There are two approaches to industrial health. The traditional one has been a negative and defensive approach. We propose a positive approach to maintain the employee in health."

Air Lines Agents Sign

Chicago—(U.P.)—The Air Lines Agents association reported today it has signed a new contract with West Coast Airlines, Inc., providing pay increases for employees in Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

The association said the agreement, reached after four days of negotiations, will result in pay increases of up to \$30 a month, and other benefits for passenger service employees.

Tigers Spill NSC; LaSalle Also Victim

Nobody, but nobody appeared safe today from the wave of upsets sweeping across the college basketball front.

Clemson must have been at least a 20-point underdog for its game with North Carolina State Tuesday night. After all, the Tigers hadn't beaten State on the hardwood since 1941.

So look what happened! Clemson laughed at the odds and handed the Wolfpack a 96-94 defeat in overtime. It was the Tigers' first victory in three games this season (they won only nine of 26 last year), and State's first defeat of the new campaign.

Vince Yockel, a "Southern gentleman" from Jersey City, N.J., scored eight of Clemson's final 10 points in regulation time to tie the score at 86-all and wound up with 31 points. Bill Yarborough's four free throws in overtime provided the Tigers with their winning margin.

In another eyebrow-raiser, Lafayette turned back once-mighty LaSalle, 84-75, for the first time since 1949. This game was won at the foul line. LaSalle outscored the Leopards from the field, 30-27, but Lafayette canned 30 of 43 free throws compared to the Explorers' 15 of 22 mark.

Fourth-ranked Southern Methodist lived to play another night, walloping Wichita, 93-70, for its fourth straight victory. The Mustangs scored 20 points in the first five minutes and wound up converting 44 of 66 field goal attempts. Jim Krebs scored 31 points for the winners.

Santa Clara Evens Series With Chiefs

San Francisco—(U.P.)—The Santa Clara Broncos evened up their two-game series with Seattle university Tuesday night by defeating the Chieftains, 85-76, with a fine display of marksmanship.

The Broncos hit 51 per cent of their shots in the first half to lead 46-41 at the intermission.

Seattle made a game of it until star center Elgin Baylor and two other key men were sidelined by the foul route. Baylor hit for 26 points before fouling out with six minutes remaining. Forward Dick Stricklin and Bill Wall followed him to the bench shortly afterward.

All of Santa Clara's starters scored in double figures, with forward Jerry Bachich leading with 24 points.

San Jose Wins
Meanwhile, the San Jose State Spartans swept to their fourth straight win of the season by defeating San Francisco State, 67-52.

High point man of the game was Gator Milt Garfield with 20—and he had 14 of them before any other member of his team scored a point.

Forward Gil Egland sparked the Spartan attack with 18. The College of Pacific Tigers made their 71-47 victory over Sacramento State an easy one by limiting the Staters to only 10 field goals with a tight defense.

Tiger center John Thomas led the scoring with 18 points and broke the school's scoring record by bringing his total to 841. Sacramento's Bob Schurr made 16 to lead his squad.

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Several Musical Outlets for Inmates

Pittsburgh—(U.P.)—Musically inclined prisoners at Western State Penitentiary have several outlets for their talents.

Inmates compose music, play in an orchestra and band or sing in an a cappella choir.

Within the confines of the prison they produce musical comedy acts, put on dance shows and perform in concerts. Occasionally, friends and relatives are invited to the concerts.

The orchestra has 18 members. The director is Ira J. Wilson, a member of the Pittsburgh Musical Society. Wilson has been employed to encourage and train inmates requesting instruction.

Thirty-six inmates form the band, and the choir is composed of 20 voices. There is also a quintet known as the Starlighters.

None of the prisoners is allowed to substitute music for daily duties. All practicing must be done during regularly scheduled recreation periods.

Some of the prisoners even submit tapes to recording firms. The musical activities definitely have a therapeutic effect.

"The inmates content themselves with music," said Wilson. "It helps them release pent-up energy. It teaches them co-operation and teamwork."

FEATHERS FOR CHICKENS

Brookings, S.D.—(U.P.)—South Dakota extension poultryman Boyd Bonzer said researchers have discovered that chickens fed a ration containing ground feathers gain faster than chicks fed the same ration without the feathers. He said it is believed some mineral in the feathers causes the extra growth.

Skin-Diving Club Helps Scientists

Berkeley, Calif.—(U.P.)—A skin-diving club is helping University of California scientists push ahead with research on cancer and fundamental problems in biology, according to a recent UC bulletin.

The young aqualing experts, members of the California Conger Club of Oakland, supply zoologists on the Berkeley campus with fresh sea urchins which are needed for their sperm and eggs in studies of cell division.

Most of the specimens brought to the laboratory by the divers are obtained in the relatively deep water in Monterey Bay, according to Henry M. Reisswig, club secretary-treasurer.

Silverton Man Freed By Marion Court Jury

Salem—(U.P.)—Norval Jackson, 23-year-old Silverton man, was acquitted of a statutory rape charge by a Marion County Circuit Court jury here yesterday. The jury's verdict was unanimous.

Math witness in the two-day trial was a 13-year-old Oregon City girl who testified Jackson had relations with her following a party last Sept. 5. Jackson denied the charge on the stand.

Several other persons are awaiting court action following indictments by the Marion county grand jury which investigated a series of "sex parties" in the Silverton area this fall.

Wife Slayer Escapes

Salem—(U.P.)—Police today were searching for Willie Moore, a 66-year-old man who escaped from the state hospital here yesterday.
