New Program Listed For AF Enlistees

"Christmas at Home" will be arranged for Jackson county men enlisting in the Air Force between Dec. 18 and Jan. 2, M/Sgt. Carson Campbell, local Air Force recruiter, has announced.

He said that delay enroute to basic military training has been approved by the Air Force for men enlisting during that time. Men not desiring the delay, he added, may be accepted for basic training at any time.

A new basic military training program has been instituted by the Air Force, Campbell said. Trainees who score high in civilian skills in aptitude tests instead of technical skills, will undergo four weeks training. Six weeks are usually required for basic training.

Purpose of the new program is to get the enlistee on the job as soon as possible. At the end of the initial four weeks of training, he said, the enlistee will be sent to a technical school. The enlistee will then receive basic training in conjunction with technical training.

Additional information regarding the program may be obtained from Sergeant Campbell at the Air Force recruiting office at the Medford post office building.

Security Council Recommends Japan As 80th UN Nation

United Nations, N.Y.—(UPI)—The Security Council today unanimously recommended the election of Japan as the 80th member of the United Nations.

The council's recommendation now goes to the general assembly for final approval, expected early next week.

After vetoing Japan's application four times since 1952, the Soviet Union today removed its objection and made possible the council's unanimous recommendation for admission of the Tokyo government.

Russia Wants Mongolia
But Soviet Ambassador Arkady A. Sobolev told the council Russia hoped it also would approve the admission of outer Mongolia, the Gobi desert country nestled between Red China and the Soviet Union in the fastness of the Asian heartland.

Last December, when the assembly, upon the council's recommendation, admitted 16 new members in a package deal, the Soviet Union insisted on linking Japan's admission with that of Outer Mongolia.

When Nationalist China vetoed the Mongolian application, Russia struck back by barring Japan with its veto.
