

Production of Uranium Concentrate Said To Be More Than Doubled During Past Year

Washington — (UP) — The Atomic Energy Commission disclosed today that the U. S. production rate for uranium concentrate has more than doubled in the past year.

Uranium concentrate (uranium oxide) is the partially refined raw material of nuclear weapons and fuels. At the start of 1956 production was at the rate of 6,000 tons a year. This month the rate was more than 12,000.

The AEC also reported for the first time figures on U. S. uranium reserves. As of Nov. 1 total reserves were estimated at 60 million tons, one-fourth of one per cent of which consists of uranium oxide.

New Mexico Highest State

The new declassified figures show that New Mexico is by far the richest state in uranium. Its reserves are 41 million tons, 68 per cent of the total. Utah is second with 7.5 million tons, and Colorado third with 4.1 million.

The AEC declassified information only on production since June 30, 1955.

It did not publish statistics about foreign uranium sources, leaving that up to the countries concerned.

Uranium is produced by private industry and sold to the AEC. The commission said publication of the statistics revealed today should "encourage further private investment in uranium mining."

Allied Evacuation of Port Said Due To Be Completed Saturday

London — (UP) — A United Nations spokesman said today in Egypt that the evacuation of Anglo-French troops from Port Said may be completed by Saturday.

The statement was made in El Ballah, 34 miles south of Port Said, where Maj. Gen. E. L. J. Burns, commander of the U.N. Emergency Force (UNEF) set up his headquarters here.

Burns said his U.N. forces would leave Port Said as soon as the Anglo-French troops leave and "as soon as the civilian governor and Egyptian police forces have taken over the city."

Arrives in American Car

Burns arrived Wednesday in an American sedan with a white license plate marked "UNEF 1." His headquarters is a converted schoolhouse on the banks of the Suez.

There has been one attack on a British patrol, and a British officer was kidnapped Tuesday. British forces still were searching for the officer and his kidnapers.

A few scattered shots were reported in Port-Said but no casualties were reported.

Clearing Minefields

In the Sinai Desert Egyptian forces were clearing minefields and repairing roads so the Yugoslav UNEF contingent could move across the desert towards Israeli positions. Burns said the operation was "proceeding slowly."

Atomic Energy, Ltd., of Canada predicted there would be enough reserves and production of uranium available from Western nation sources "for large scale nuclear power programs in the free world for about the next 30 years."

Poznan Workers Urge Support To Condemn Russia

London — (UP) — Polish steelworkers in Poznan — starting point for the wage of unrest sweeping the satellites — appealed to workers throughout the nation today to join them in condemning Soviet intervention in Hungary.

Representatives of 30,000 Polish steelworkers met in Poznan Wednesday night and climaxed a week of anti-Russian demonstrations in Poland with a demand the Russian troops in Hungary be replaced by United Nations or Warsaw Pact forces.

To Appeal to UN

They forwarded their appeals today to other Polish workers and said they would send directly to U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold their appeal for replacement of the Russians by an international police force.

Moscow Radio almost ignored the wave of unrest today and smothered Czechoslovakia with glowing slogans of eternal friendship.

Moscow Radio broadcast a dispatch in the official Communist newspaper Pravda praising Czechoslovakia on the 13th anniversary of the Soviet-Czech friendship and alliance treaty. The flowing praise was notable in view of Czechoslovakia's denouncing of the Hungarian revolution.

The Warsaw correspondent of Pravda reported the "Polish public" had condemned "provocateurs and adventurers" who rioted Monday in Stettin, Poland, but it did not mention the attack on the Soviet consulate.

It also failed to report the Poznan steelworkers action.

The Poznan action followed a day of demonstrations for Hungary and against the Soviet Union from other cities in Poland.

Eight children and their parents filed suit last fall asking a permanent injunction to prohibit Union county school officials from refusing to admit Negroes to the all-white Sturgis school.

Their entrance touched off a student boycott which ended only when the states attorney general's office ruled they were attending school illegally, and they were refused admission.

The four Negro pupils who were refused admission at Clay elementary school went to Rosenwald school at Providence.

Dulles' Policy To 'Go-It-Alone' Irks NATO Ministers

Paris — (UP) — Ministers of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization countries wrangled today over Secretary of State John Foster Dulles' "go-it-alone" policy.

It was only a month ago that Americans bitterly criticized Britain and France for invading Egypt without advising the United States of their plans in advance. Wednesday, Dulles told NATO foreign ministers the United States will not be bound by NATO plan of prior consultation on action affecting other member nations of the Atlantic Alliance.

As an example, Dulles said the United States would certainly act first and talk later if Communist China attacked Formosa.

He made it clear the United States reserves its independence of action in situations demanding immediate response to meet U. S. treaty obligations or to protect vital U. S. interests.

The U. S. policy declaration touched off a storm of argument which was expected to continue throughout today's meeting of the NATO council.

On the other hand, there was only mild reaction to a "grand design" for a close knit Atlantic community with its own parliament outlined Wednesday by British Foreign Minister Selwyn Lloyd. Reaction was described as friendly but largely non-committal pending further study.

The British themselves said it was a "long-term" design and by no means a formal proposal for immediate action or even hurried consideration.

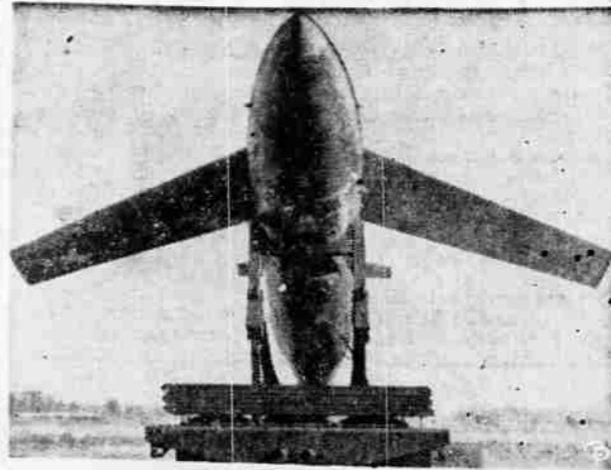
Dairymen in attendance at the meeting agreed that a price rise is needed but they differed in their views on the best means of obtaining it.
