

APPLEGATE-JACKSONVILLE Grange To Get New Hall

 Applegate-Jacksonville Grange, which has been in operation for over a year, has been constructing a new hall on two and a half acres of land donated by Frank Preston, real estate dealer and ranch owner.

The walls are completed, and the structure is ready for the roof according to William Nostrand, chairman of the building committee. Weather conditions are preventing progress at present, Nostrand said.

A number of contractors have been given the construction work. Ray Wadner of the community is doing the carpentry, Carl Dillon of Central Point, the block work, Meelan and Son of Murphy, Modern Plumbing and Heating company of Medford, the wiring, and Southern Oregon Heating company of Medford will install a gas heating system.

The roofing will be of Redwood shingles, Nostrand said. The building is 36 by 100 feet, somewhat larger than the log building which was destroyed by fire. Plans include a stage, dining and kitchen area, and rest rooms, and space will be provided for a fireplace to built at a future date.

The hall is located a mile south of Little Applegate bridge. Grangers will continue meeting in the Richwood cafeteria until the building is completed.

Nehru Figures 32,000 Killed in Hungary

New Delhi—(AP)—Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru estimated today in Parliament that 25,000 Hungarians and 7,000 Soviet troops had been killed in the Hungarian revolution.

Nehru said there is no large-scale fighting going on in Hungary at present but a considerable measure of passive resistance.


He said Ambassador to Moscow K. P. S. Menon reported he found conditions in Budapest "reminiscent of the civil disobedience movement in India" against the British.

Illinois Roommate Slays Grid Player

Carbondale, Ill.—(AP)—An inquest was scheduled today into the slaying of a Southern Illinois university football star by his portly roommate during a dispute over a minor prank.

Fred Sinroll, 20, Sterling, Ill., admitted killing one of his three roommates with a shotgun blast Wednesday, but claimed the shooting was accidental. He was held without bail on murder charges filed by Sheriff Howard Cheatham.

The victim, Robert Batura, 19, Danvers, Mass., a sophomore and star pass receiver on the SIU squad, was shot in the head at point blank range by a charge from a 12 gauge shotgun.

The other two roommates, John Abramovitch, 21, Haverhill, Mass., described as "practically a brother" to Batura, and Henry Hillman Jr., 18, Park Ridge, Ill., were hospitalized for shock after the shooting.

Probe Scheduled In Marine Shooting

San Diego, Calif.—(AP)—A Marine Corps court of inquiry scheduled an investigation today into the fatal shooting Wednesday of a Marine prisoner who broke from his guards and fled to halt when ordered.

The names of the prisoner and the guard who shot him were not released immediately.

Marine Corps officials at the recruit depot here scheduled a court of inquiry immediately following the shooting.

A Marine spokesman said the prisoner broke away from two guards while being returned to the brig after having undergone a medical examination to determine his fitness for confinement.

The spokesman said the prisoner ignored repeated warnings "to halt" and the guard took aim and fired, felling the victim with a single shot. The prisoner died instantly.
