

Communist China's Attitude Toward U.S. Said Changed

New Delhi, India—(U.P.)—Communist China has changed its attitude toward the United States in the past two years, and now seeks better relations with the U.S. government, India's Premier Jawaharlal Nehru said Wednesday night.

Nehru told American newsmen at a press conference he "definitely" noticed a change of attitude of Red China Premier Chou En Lai.

"Chou's whole attitude seems to be to want better relations with the United States," the Indian prime minister said. "I suppose the Communist Chinese have settled down and are more confident. They have no first class wars."

Questions Due at Talks

Nehru is expected to bring up the question of Sino-American relations in talks with U.S. officials when he arrives in Washington next week for a meeting with President Eisenhower.

Asked how Indo-American relations will be benefited by his talks with Mr. Eisenhower, Nehru said, "I really cannot say. But I am greatly looking forward to going there. One result of our meeting will be a better understanding and more avenues of cooperation. I cannot define these things."

Nehru said he had a high opinion of President Eisenhower.

"He is a great man as an individual and occupies a very great position," he said.

India's political leader said the United States and Russia should stop shipment of arms to the Middle East as one step in solving the Suez crisis.

Educational TV Station Seeks Help

Portland—(U.P.)—Spokesman for Community Television, Inc., proposed an educational outlet here, yesterday carried their plan for acquisition of channel 30 to a group of prospects to help support the proposed station.

The audience were public schools and college officials, labor and management representatives, parent-teacher and club leaders.

Loren B. Stone, manager of KCIS, educational television station in Seattle, was on hand to outline to the group the plan in operation in Seattle. He warned Portland proponents of the outlet to "look at it very realistically" before they venture into the field.

A few tentative commitments of money were made at the meeting but the session closed with a decision to appoint sub-committees to find out just what services might be obtained from the station as a basis for compiling an accurate budget.

Association Raps Fuel Oil Price Hike

Portland—(U.P.)—Oregon Apartment House Association members yesterday took a swipe at the recent price increase in fuel oils, saying the price hike was "unreasonable" and placed price adjustments on householders and property owners.

In a resolution adopted by the association's annual convention, the group said no comparable increase had been made on gasoline and other petroleum products by the major oil companies.

The question of higher rents to offset the price increase did not come up for discussion but some apartment managers said they were concerned that rent levels might have to be adjusted to meet rising operating costs.

William J. Wolverton, chairman of a special oil committee, said the price rise last month was the fourth since October, 1953 and amounted to an increase of one-third in the price of oil during that time.

Irvin Mann Said To Be Improving

Portland—(U.P.)—Irvin Mann, state representative from Adams and elected minority leader of the State House of Representatives, was reported to be in moderately improved condition at a Portland hospital today.

Irvin Mann Jr., the legislator's son, said his father's condition earlier had been very serious and still remained serious, although attendants had reported moderate improvement.

82-year-old Mann was hospitalized for treatment of a back injury. His son said the injury was sustained several years ago and that it had been aggravated this summer.
