Salem School Board To Redesign Buildings

Salem — (UPI) — Salem school board decided to redesign its two new junior high school buildings last night after a three-week battle to cut costs to meet an over-size bid.

A new target date for opening new bids on the buildings was set at mid-March. Architect William L. Williams was told to come up with a plan that would fit the district's \$2,400,000 budget.

Hope of having the two 1,000-pupil schools ready for use next fall was abandoned several weeks ago due to a shortage of structural steel.

GM Will Produce Automobiles in Brazil

Rio de Janeiro — (UPI) — General Motors Corp. has become the first of the American "big three" automobile companies to receive Brazilian government approval to begin production in this country.

GM, which heretofore only assembled motor vehicles in Brazil using largely imported parts, received approval of its plans Thursday. The only U. S. company now producing vehicles here is Willys Overland, which turns out 35 Jeeps daily.

Nehru May Meet With Eden on Return Trip

New Delhi, India — (UPI) — Indian Premier Jawaharlal Nehru, who leaves for the United States today to visit President Eisenhower, said he may meet with British Prime Minister Anthony Eden on his return trip from Washington.

He said he plans to stop in London for one day on his return flight to New Delhi.
