Both family and friends enjoy homemade candy during the Christmas season. When a recipe calls for nuts, try using Oregon filberts and you will be pleased with the result.

Here is a recipe for Filbert Date Roll: Two cups sugar, 1 cup light cream, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 pound chopped dates, 1 cup chopped Oregon filberts, 1/2 cup shredded coconut, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

Combine sugar, cream and salt. Cook until mixture reaches soft ball stage in cold water, or 238 degrees on a candy thermometer. Add chopped dates. Cook until mixture separates from the pan when stirred. (Takes about two minutes.) Add the chopped filberts, coconut and vanilla. Beat until cool. Pour onto a wet cloth and form into a roll. Cool, cut into slices. Makes 60 slices. 1 1/2 inches in diameter. Filberts may also be used in fudge and divinity.

Old Recipe Book Has Instructions For Baked Pears

Baked pears are good news. A recipe book, The Lady's Complete Guide, written in 1789, more than 1 and a half centuries ago, throws a recipe for baked pears, somewhat different than the present day recommendation. It reads: "Take pears, pare them, cut them in halves and core them. Then put them in an earthen pan with a few cloves, a little water, and a wine, and about half a pound of sugar to six pears. Bake them over moderately for then set them over a slow fire, let them steep gently in a lemon-juice in small sippets. If the syrup is not rich enough, add more sugar.

In our modern time with nutrition, some of the homemakers, the pears are not peeled. They are put into a baking pan with a little water and lemon juice, cut side down and baked until tender, about 25 minutes at 375 degrees. Then the pears are turned and a small amount of sugar is added, about 1/2 tablespoon to a pear half and the pears are baked for 10 minutes longer to dissolve the sugar and glaze the pears.
