Washington—(U.P.)—"Let's eat out" is a phrase growing in national popularity, the U.S. Department of Agriculture reports.

The department said that at least 20 per cent of the money this nation spends on food now goes to the restaurant industry.

"If the population grows, as expected, and if the pattern of eating out continues," the department said, "the number of meals purchased away from home should increase 75 per cent by 1975."

The department, which recently made a survey of the use of frozen foods in restaurants, also estimated that by 1975 restaurant demand will boost the frozen vegetable pack 14 per cent; the frozen fruit pack four per cent.
