### City Families Spend More on Food, Liquor Than Country Cousins

Corvallis—City families spend about 75 per cent more for food and alcoholic beverages than farm families, reports Mrs. Elvera Horrell, extension agricultural economist at Oregon State college.

She says a 1955 survey by the U. S. department of agriculture showed rural families spent an average of \$17 a week, compared to \$30 a week spent by city families. Rural nonfarm families were in between, spending an average of \$24 a week for food and alcoholic beverages.

This doesn't mean farm families have smaller appetites, Mrs. Horrell hastens to add. They produce a part of their food on their farms and in their gardens. And farm families tend to buy fewer services in the form of processed foods and prepared meals.

Regardless of how much they spend, there should be plenty of food for both rural and city families during the holiday season ahead.

Even before this year's harvest, the nation's cupboards were far from bare. And on top of that, Mrs. Horrell says farmers appear to be on their way towards making their 1956 crop output one of the largest on record—in spite of drought in some sections of the nation.

### For Holiday Pies

New York — (AP) — For a spicy pie crust, try this method. Mix 1 teaspoon of ground nutmeg with the contents of a package of crust mix. Mix, roll and bake as directed on the package. Good with apple, mince, pumpkin, raisin or custard pies.

### LESSON IN HERBS

Many new cooks would like to try herb cookery but don't know quite where to plunge in. Here's a suggestion from the Gas Appliance Manufacturers association: Use your first herbs in soup. This way you can taste them, see the delicate differences in taste when they contribute and so learn about them.

For instance, try sesame or caraway seeds in celery soup; add a pinch of basil to frozen-snapper soup; blend sage in almost any potage; clear hot consommé is enlivened by a bit of curry or nutmeg or thyme or mace. Remember—use a light hand and taste it as you go.

Have you ever served ripe pears with sweet cream? Sweet, juicy Anjou pears lend themselves to this fruit treat equally as well as other fruits which may be better known as being delicious with cream.

Plan to include ripe Anjou or Bosc pears in the school lunch or the packaged lunch of the wage earner of your family. They are easy to eat—no peeling—and are filled with energy from its sweet levulose sugar.

#### Leftovers Make Turnovers

New York — (AP) — Holiday leftovers of pastry and mince meat can be turned into tempting turnovers. If you have pastry left from baking, roll it out to pie crust thickness and cut into three-inch squares. Put a generous tablespoon of mince meat on each square. Fold into triangles and press edges with a fork. Bake in a hot oven (450 degrees), for 12 to 15 minutes.



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
