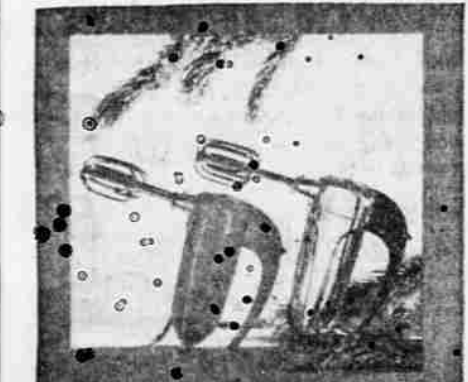

Tigard, Ore. — (U.P.) — Authorities today hunted a "phantom" gunman who wounded a woman and shot at two others homes late Sunday night.

State Policemen James Bauman said Mrs. Zella May Mabab, 43, was struck in the shoulder by a .22 caliber bullet as she slept. He said it was one of four bullets fired at the home. It passed through a wall before striking her and she was not seriously hurt.

Bauman said at least two other homes were fired at. One bullet narrowly missed Joseph W. Meats and another passed through a wall and struck the ceiling above the head of Mrs. James Patecky.

Bauman said it was believed the shots were fired by someone in a car.
