New England Gets Subzero Cold Wave

A subzero cold wave, made more biting by high winds, rolled into northern New England today.

The eastward drift of the Canadian air extended the influence of the cold air mass throughout most of the nation. The only exceptions were the extreme Southwest and the Pacific Northwest.

Mild Pacific air flowed through the Northwest from Washington and Oregon to the western Dakotas.

Warmer temperatures were reported in the Midwest with the departure of the core of the cold air wave. A warmup of nearly 40 degrees occurred in some sections of the Upper Mississippi valley.

A light freezing rain made driving hazardous in parts of eastern North Dakota and northern Minnesota.

Showers and thunderstorms dumped up to a quarter-inch of rain on parts of Texas in a six hour period during the night, and lesser amounts fell on Kansas and Oklahoma.

Five Firms Submit Low Ice Harbor Bids

Walla Walla — (U.P.) — Army engineers announced here yesterday that a bid of \$29,475,396 submitted by a combine of five firms, was the apparent low bid for major construction on Ice Harbor dam.

The contract calls for construction of a power house skeleton structure, 7 1/2 spillway bays, the south shore fish ladder and left bank abutment.

Firms combining on the bid were C. J. Montag and son, Inc., Portland; Carl Halverson, Inc., Portland; McLaughlin, Inc., Great Falls, Mont.; Austin Construction Co., Seattle, and Babler Bros., Inc., Portland. Three bids were submitted on the job.

The federal government had estimated cost of the jobs involved at \$30,984,868.
