Want "Different" Gifts? See If the Store Has These

Editor's Note: In the interest of helping those who just can't think of a Christmas gift for the man or woman "who has everything," United Press bureaus around the nation have gone shopping. In the following dispatches, some of their "finds" for both him and her are listed. U.P.A.N.Y.

HIS: New York—UPI—No need to neglect the men on your list this Christmas.

The manufacturers have seen to it that the unusual is available to accompany the traditional ties, socks and wallets. A United Press check shows such items as uranium cuff links, mink-decorated golf clubs and a rare collection of pipes available for the man who "has everything."

Even the necktie can be different this season. One Memphis store features a tie with a concealed zipper pocket for holding money.

Those cuff links are featured by a Dallas specialty shop (\$22 a set). An Atlanta cigar store shows the gift case of 28 pipes, one of 12 such cases produced each year (\$2,500).

A Kansas City store offers a set of golf club covers with mink tails. The No. one club has one tail, the No. two a pair of tails, and so on with the No. four club sporting four (\$95.70, including tax).

If milady wants to present the man on her list with a new car several dealers offer to Christmas wrap it and deliver it to the front door Christmas morning. One Detroit dealer offers to have Santa himself drive a bed-ridden and seal-wrapped Cadillac up to the front door on Christmas morning.

There are gifts from the sports car enthusiasts too. One San Francisco store offers a mink beret to keep the driver's head warm. (\$390).

For the family man, who wants a Christmas tree a little different a San Francisco florist offers a native pine, 30 feet tall, trimmed with ceramic Russian eggs, and ornaments from Belgium, Germany and the Scandinavian countries (\$3,000).

Here is a shopper's guide to offer items the man might not buy for himself: A "fisherman's pearl," which scales fish, open bottles and "does everything for the fisherman" (\$7.95); a shotgun for sportsmen also; hand-made and imported \$2,000; an alligator traveling garment bag (\$1,250); an elegant stud box which holds 60 pairs of studs and cuff links, and has a slip-out case holding only a few pairs for travel (\$65).

An 18-karat, 18-inch calendar wrist watch, which shows the day, month and year, allows for leap year, and shows the phases of the moon (\$1,650); a walnut tool chest with Sheffield steel tools equipped with genuine ivory handles (\$550); cuff links with jeweled watch in one link (\$190); an electric shoe shiner (\$30).

And for the father-to-be, a diamond and platinum safety pin (\$500, plus tax).

HERS: New York—UPI—A woman might as well be glamorous while hanging out the Monday wash. So why not give her jeweled clothespins—only \$2 each.

The pins, from a Memphis store, are just one gift in an almost unbelievable collection of items the nation's stores and specialty shops this season offer as Christmas gifts for the woman who has everything. The store suggested the clothespins as desk accessories, but said they also could serve the laundry.

Or, there are gold raincoats, rhinestone door knockers, mink napkin rings, diamond-studded stockings, a mink bath mat and seat cover, or a jeweled, stuffed tiger.

That tiger, available from a Dallas specialty shop, is priced at a cool \$1,000,000. The gems which adorn it are the McCoy.

The gold raincoat, from a San Francisco store, is lined with an antique Spanish shawl and the works costs \$595. The rhinestone door knockers, from a Detroit store, are a combination of old-fashioned brass and jewels (\$7.98).

The mink napkin rings, from an Atlanta shop, come in sets of four (\$7.98). Milady also can have pink, either the dark ranch or silverblu, for the bathroom—both the bath mats and lid covers are offered by a Chicago store. Or, an Atlanta shop offers a jewel-and-royal-decorated "Buffy Bonnet" of nylon net (\$7.98). One Chicago store offers to attach a diamond to hosiery, and the donor can specify the size and location (\$750, starting price).

Here's a shopper's guide to other gifts a man might not otherwise find: A vicuna sport coat by Dior (\$800); an abony wand with gold trim, which actually is a cigarette holder, \$12.95; a jeweled ice bag (starting at \$4.95 and going on up, depending on amount of jewels desired).

A pair of dark glasses, diamond-studded with platinum frames for the girl who wants to be conspicuously inconspicuous (\$2,750); a seven-piece set of alligator luggage (\$5,000).

A lounging outfit of brandy-colored Chantilly lace, with negligee topping knee-length pants. The negligee has a brandy-colored fox fur collar (\$595).

A giant carnation, with 16-inch bloom (\$4.50); a cuff link watch (\$12.95); a bracelet charm, with mobile ballerina in a cage (\$135); a Carlin white maribou chaise longue cover with matching white maribou pillow, both with pleated nylon ruffles (\$450 per set).

And, a solid gold dental floss dispenser offered by a San Francisco store (\$95, plus tax).
