## Nixon Travels To Refugee Camp Near Border of Hungary

### Massive Security Escort Provided

Vienna — (U.P.) — Vice-President Richard M. Nixon journeyed today with a massive security escort to a camp for Hungarian refugees only 11 miles from the Communist frontier.

The trip from Vienna to Neusiedl, where thousands fled to freedom from the Red terror in Hungary last month, took Nixon and his entourage slightly more than an hour.

From Neusiedl, Nixon's 30-car motorcade bumped over a desolate marsh road to Andau, less than half a mile from the Iron Curtain border.

He spent 90 minutes at the Andau refugee camp talking with Hungarians who had crawled to safety through the swamp nearby. One was a legless man who had been carried from Hungary by friends.

The refugees lined the streets to cheer the vice-president as he left.

More than 500 police were deployed in the frontier region in a massive security operation. Nixon did not go all the way to the border canal, but the dread Hungarian secret police waiters that formerly sealed off the border with machine guns could be seen from Andau through a glass mist.

First Step on Tour

Neusiedl was Nixon's first stop on a tour of Austria for the border area in which were marked the escape routes used by the refugees from Communism.

Nixon shook hands with local district officials at Neusiedl, who welcomed him to the border town.

The vice-president carried to Austria a message from President Eisenhower to Chancellor Julius Raab praising Austria for opening its borders to the heavy inflow of refugees.

Cherf, Sandkay and Birch Construction company, Ephrata, Wash., submitted a bid of \$1,717,528; Vinson Construction company, Phoenix, Ariz., bid \$2,443,873.51; and John Delphia, Patterson, Calif., bid \$2,479,718. Engineer's estimate was \$1,122,540.

## California Man Held on Charges Of Armed Robbery

Carl Russell Campbell, 24, of Oakley, Calif., arrested by state police yesterday on a concealed weapons charge, is being held here for Contra Costa county authorities on a charge of armed robbery.

Campbell's 17-year-old brother, Paul Edward Campbell, was arrested for having no operator's license, police said.

Police and sheriff's deputies said the older Campbell has admitted in a statement that he robbed four or five patrons of a tavern in Byron, Calif.

Contra Costa county authorities said tavern patrons reported they were robbed of about \$60. The robbery occurred about 9:50 p.m. Tuesday, police said.

Police and sheriff's deputies said Campbell told them that after the robbery, he went home and asked his younger brother if he would like to go to Portland with him.

The brothers were stopped near Rogue Valley ballroom on Highway 99 south of Medford for a routine check, state police said. Carl Campbell was carrying a 32 caliber revolver in his belt when stopped, police said.

The older Campbell has signed a waiver, police said, and is being held in Jackson county jail for extradition to Oakley.

## Officials to Discuss Use of Coyote Poison

Don Donahoe, newly appointed U. S. fish and wildlife service supervisor for six southwestern Oregon counties, was to be present at a meeting in the county courtroom this afternoon on the use of coyote poison.

Also planning to attend were members of the county court, directors of the Jackson County Stockmen's association and representatives of the Southern Oregon Hound Owners association, as well as others interested in obtaining an effective coyote control program here.

Donahoe, whose headquarters are in Roseburg, was appointed supervisor for this district on Nov. 1. He succeeds Gene Albert, who resigned after serving in this district for several years.

Donahoe was fish and wildlife service supervisor in the north-west Oregon district for six years prior to coming to southern Oregon.

at the Camp White bureau of reclamation office, but the other bidders notified the bureau that bids had been mailed. Bureau of reclamation officials said one bid was received late Tuesday and the third yesterday morning. They believed the Christmas mailing rush delayed them.

The bids will be forwarded to the Denver, Colo., office for consideration. The contract probably will not be awarded for about 30 days.

The first section of the delivery canal will extend from the Howard Prairie dam site on Beaver creek north of Little Chiniquapin mountain to Little Beaver creek, a distance of about 10 miles.

Bids for construction of the dam were opened earlier this year. Howard Prairie reservoir will hold about 60,500 acre feet of water behind the 840-foot long earth-fill dam.

The reservoir will provide additional water for the Talent irrigation district and increase to more than 17,000 acres the total acreage which will benefit from the project.

Bids on the second section of the delivery canal, the Keene creek diversion dam, Green Springs tunnel site, road relocation and the Green Springs power plant will be opened about next June, bureau of reclamation officials said.

The road relocation will be at Klamath junction on Highway 66 where increased capacity of Emigrant reservoir will inundate the present road.

## Child Kidnaped In Summer Found

Creston, Iowa — (U.P.) — A Utah child kidnaped last summer has been located unharmed at a farm home near here, authorities announced today.

Sheriff J. R. Ewing and the FBI said Dennis Carter, 19-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. John B. Carter, Sandy, Utah, was found Wednesday night.

Two persons were held by authorities for questioning. The child was taken by Ewing and his wife to a juvenile home at Des Moines to await his parents.

Ewing said police arrested Mrs. Maxine Radford, Des Moines, at Des Moines Dec. 12. Her husband, Leland, was located in jail at Oskaloosa.

Authorities said the child was found at a farm home in Union County, but the Radfords were not there. They declined to name the family which was caring for the child.

Authorities said Mrs. Radford told them the Carters "gave" her the baby "because they couldn't afford to support him."

Dennis disappeared from his home July 18, Ewing said, but kidnaping charges weren't filed until Nov. 28.

## One Man Near Death In Ontario Accident

Ontario — (U.P.) — One man was near death in an Ontario hospital and nine others were less seriously injured in a six-car pile-up on Highway 30 one mile north of here today.

Cars driven by Pierce Parker, 29, a Salt Lake City geologist, and by Robert Beck, 20, of Clarks, Neb., collided head-on in the fog and the other four cars crashed into them minutes later.

Critically injured and given only slight chances to survive was 23-year-old Bobby Lee Backus of Belle, Mo. Hospital attendants said he suffered head and chest injuries. Parker had head and leg injuries and Beck suffered head injuries. Backus and Beck were enroute to their homes after being discharged yesterday at Ft. Lewis, Wash.

## Joseph Carson, Former Portland Mayor, Succumbs

Portland — (U.P.) — Joseph K. Carson, former mayor of Portland, state senator, and ex-member of the United States Maritime Commission, died in his sleep here today, the day following his 65th birthday anniversary.

Carson was long prominent in Democratic party affairs and in 1934 was the Democratic nominee for governor of Oregon. He was defeated by the late Paul Patterson. Recently he had resumed his Portland law practice.

Survivors include his widow, the former Myrtle Cradick, and two children, Joan, 18, and Lucian, 17.

Carson was born Dec. 19, 1891, in McKinney, Ky., the youngest of 12 children. The family moved to Hood River, Oregon, in 1903.

Carson worked his way through the University of Oregon law school and enlisted in the Oregon Coast Artillery two weeks after he was admitted to the bar in 1917. He served overseas in World War I and reached the rank of captain.

He maintained an interest in veterans affairs and in 1941 was state commander of the American Legion. In World War II he was recalled to the Army and rose to the rank of lieutenant colonel, spending 28 months in Europe in staff positions.

He first entered politics as a candidate for the Oregon Legislature in 1922. He lost that year but was elected in 1924. In 1926 he was the Democratic nominee for Congress, losing to Maurice Crumpacker, the GOP incumbent. In 1930 he was elected secretary of the Democratic State Central Committee and won his first race for mayor of Portland in 1932.

Carson was appointed to the Maritime Commission by ex-President Harry Truman in 1947 and served until 1950. He spent the next 18 months in New York as secretary of the Propeller Club of the United States.

## U. S. Proposes Private Talks on Disarmament

### Five-Power Meeting In March Suggested

United Nations, N.Y. — (U.P.) — The United States proposed today that the five great atomic powers resume private talks on disarmament next March.

U.S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge Jr. told the U.N. Disarmament Commission that later in the General Assembly he would move formally that the subcommittee comprising the United States, Russia, Britain, France and Canada start a new round of secret talks. The talks would begin after the current assembly session ends.

No Hint of Proposals  
He gave no hint of proposals the United States might be prepared to make at such a meeting. There has been hints leaked out of Washington concerning new American disarmament proposals and at least one delegate, Yugoslavia's Joza Brilej, said today the latest U.S. position was awaited with interest.

Soviet Ambassador Arkady A. Sobolev, who had requested today's brief meeting of the 12-nation commission spoke only four minutes and referred but passing to the latest disarmament suggestions of Russian Premier Nikolai Bulganin.

The General Assembly was meeting at the same time to debate a proposal by 19 Latin American countries and Spain to add two non-permanent seats to the 11-member Security Council.

The Assembly added Iraq, Colombia and Sweden to the Security Council Wednesday as the latest of the six non-permanent members.

The 20 powers sought to break down Soviet opposition to expansion of the council by proposing a charter guarantee of one non-permanent seat for Eastern Europe.

Demos Won't Get Vote From Francis  
Dayton, Ore. — (U.P.) — State Sen. Carl Francis, Dayton Republican, said yesterday he would answer "no" to a request that he vote with the Democrats to organize the evenly-divided Oregon Senate.

The Yamhill county Democratic Central Committee resolved Monday night to ask Francis to vote with the Democrats on Senate organization.

"I am sure I would not be rewarded with honor," Francis said. Asked if he might change his position before the Legislature meets next month he replied "I'm not going to commit myself. You can't tell what might happen in a month."

Meanwhile, three Republican state senators met here yesterday and decided to wait for suggestions from the Democrats on what to do about organizing the state Senate next month. The Senate is evenly split with 15 Democrats and 15 Republicans.

The GOP committee of Sens. Rudie Wilhelm Jr., Howard Belton and Lee Ohmart decided not to make another offer.

## Asland Cab Driver Robbed of \$13.85

Douglas H. Wall, Asland cab driver, reported to Phoenix and state police last night that two young men had robbed him of \$13.85.

The robbery occurred on the Fern Valley road about 10 p.m. yesterday. Wall told police the two men were about 18 or 19 years old. He said he believed one of the men had a gun, although he told police he did not see it. He said the men threatened to kill him if he did not give them his money, police said.

After the robbery, the men told the taxi driver to stop, got out and indicated they had a car parked a short distance away, and started walking, Wall reported.

Wall said they drove away in the opposite direction. He contacted Phoenix police, who called state police and the sheriff's office.

## POW Exchange With Anglo-French Command Dropped

### New Delays Seen In Canal Opening

London — (U.P.) — Egypt accused France today of "deporting" 156 Egyptian officers and men and called off a scheduled exchange of prisoners of war with the Anglo-French command.

The accusation came amid indications of new delays in U.N. assignment to open the blocked Suez Canal and get badly needed oil supplies flowing again to Western Europe.

Authoritative sources in Cairo said Israel's refusal to give up the Gaza Strip may throw a major block in the negotiations for clearing the vital waterway.

Postponement of the prisoner exchange scheduled for today was announced by an Egyptian government official in Cairo.

He said the transfer of troops captured by both sides in the recent fighting was called off "because we have been informed that the French have deported six Egyptian officers and 150 soldiers." The U.N. Emergency Force Command was to act as the intermediary.

Unconfirmed Reports  
Reports circulated in Egypt earlier this week that the French and British planned to take Egyptian hostages when they pulled out of Port Said. The report said the British would hold civilian and military prisoners in reprisal for the kidnaping of a 26-year-old British lieutenant in Port Said a week ago. The reports were not confirmed.

France, Britain and Israel have complained at the U.N. General Assembly over the alleged mass deportation and mistreatment of their nationals by the Egyptian government.

## Eden Party Wins By Slim Margin

London — (U.P.) — Prime Minister Anthony Eden's Conservative party today won a slim victory in a by-election that was almost a shaky vote of confidence in his Suez policy.

Conservative candidate Miss Mervyn Pike, director of a pottery firm, gained a thin majority of 2,362 votes over opposition Laborite E. J. Masters in a by-election at Melton Mowbray in the hunting county of Leicestershire 100 miles north of London.

The previous Conservative majority was 10,789 votes, but that was in a general election and heavy fog cut down the voters turn out Wednesday to a little more than 56 per cent of the electorate.

The Melton Mowbray seat was left vacant by the resignation of Minister of State Anthony Nutting, who represented this district before he walked out of the government in protest over Eden's Suez attack.

## Hungarian Puppet Head Hints at Political Talks

Vienna — (U.P.) — The Hungarian puppet Communist regime hinted it will open preliminary talks with non-Communist political leaders today in an attempt to appease Hungary's still-defiant millions by broadening the cabinet.

Soviet-imposed Premier Janos Kadar frankly admitted the political struggle for the allegiance of Hungarians — who saw the fight for freedom from Moscow's domination crushed by Russian armed might — was an all-important one.

Washington — (U.P.) — The Post Office promises to see that "no Christmas mail remains undelivered in post offices on Christmas Day."

## Eisenhower and Nehru Declare Talks Confirm 'Broad Area of Agreement'

Washington — (U.P.) — President Eisenhower and Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru of India said today their "full and frank talks" confirmed a "broad area of agreement" about world problems.

Leaves for New York  
In a joint communique issued by the White House as Nehru left for New York at the end of his four-day state visit here, the two leaders predicted that their meeting of minds will speed achievement of "peaceful and friendly relations among all nations of the world."

## Sale of 140 Million Board Feet Planned In Medford BLM Area

Plans to advertise for sale about 140 million board feet of timber in 1957 have been announced by the Medford district of the bureau of land management.

The total represents a considerable increase over plans for any previous year in the district, according to the district forester's office.

The volume will be represented in at least 50 separate tracts throughout the district. Sales are expected to vary from less than 100,000 to about 9 million board feet with an average volume of about 25 million board feet per sale, officials said.

Medford District  
The Medford district is composed of lands administered by the BLM in Jackson and Josephine counties, southwestern Klamath county, southern Douglas county, and a small acreage in eastern Coos and Curry counties.

Artificial reforestation activities will be required on a greater number of cutting areas during the coming year than has been done in the past, the announcement said. This is to assure the fullest possible use of the forest lands with the least possible delay from the time of cutting.

Funds for the increased program were made available to the bureau by O and C counties, which have agreed that some \$1 million of their shares of O and C funds be used for reforestation.

Information regarding the timber sale plan, the individual tracts to be sold, and other data, may be obtained from the district forester's office in the Medford-city hall.

## 11 Families Flee Fire at Coos Bay

Coos Bay — (U.P.) — Fire last night drove 11 families, numbering some 30 persons, from their homes in a two-story frame apartment house here.

The Arcade Apartments on South Broadway was destroyed. The city had attempted to have the building condemned and it was only partly occupied by an agreement with the owner. It was to have been torn down next June.

The flames spread rapidly and the occupants barely escaped with their lives. Firemen said there was no estimate of damage and the building itself was considered almost worthless. Adjacent buildings were saved from the flames.

San Francisco — (U.P.) — A helicopter drove 11 minutes before landing opera star Mary Gray at the Ferry Building seaport plunged upside down into San Francisco Bay today, killing the pilot, Robert Louis Waller, 27, San Leandro.
