Austin, Tex.—UP—Labor commissioner M. B. Morgan today announced the suspension of two California welterweight boxers for agreeing to throw a fight at San Antonio.

Morgan said he had indefinitely suspended Art Aragon for "agreeing to throw a fight with his opponent to take a dive."

Dick Goldstein, Aragon's opponent, was suspended for 30 days for "agreeing to take a dive, although he strenuously denied any intention of going through with it," Morgan said.

The suspensions bar either fighter from boxing in any state but New York.

Goldstein Accused

Goldstein accused Aragon of offering him \$500 to take a dive in the fourth round of their scheduled fight Tuesday night in San Antonio and threatening to kill him unless he accepted.

The two fighters, both of Los Angeles, appeared before Morgan and Boxing Commissioner Alton Erickson at a hastily called hearing in San Antonio Wednesday.

Later, both took lie detector tests at San Antonio police headquarters.

PCC Hoop Crown Forseen This Season for Cal Bears

(This is another in a series on West Coast collegiate basketball prospects.)

Berkeley, Calif.—UP—Pete Newell, coach of the University of California basketball team, will probably do more cheering and less chomping on his favorite towel this season, if early season results are an indication.

Nervous Newell, who tranquilizes himself during each and every game by team plays by chewing constantly on a wadded Turkish towel, has the workings of a Pacific Coast conference championship team.

Back are eight veterans of the team Pete took to a third place PCC finish last season, his second year as Cal coach. To date the experience-laden club has won two, dropped two and looked like potential champs in '56.

The losses, which came within a bounce of the ball of being Cal upsets, were to top-ranked Kansas and defending national champion San Francisco.

Newell has built his team around two of the veterans, captain Larry Friend at forward and Earl Robinson, a 6-1 junior guard. The 6-3 Friend is a push shot artist and a fancy ball handler with a 21 plus scoring average in the first four games.

Robbie, a stock production of former UCLA great Jackie Robinson (no relation), was the spark that nearly paced Cal to a win over Kansas Tuesday. The Bears led all the way up until two minutes after Robinson left the game, via the foul route, with 12 minutes remaining.

Starting center is Dufne Asplund, a deceptive 6-7 senior

who had the unwanted task of guarding fabulous Wilt Chamberlain Tuesday night and "he" the 40-point-per-game Kansas to 23 points.

Camming with Friend up front is 6-6 Don McGosh, who along with Asplund dominates the boards on rebounds, while Robinson's running mate is Gabe Arrillaga, a foot ball hawking senior and a terror with his favored driving layup shot.

Cal is backed with a good bench, including sophomore Joe Kapp, a forward who was the Bear's starting quarterback this past grid season.

California, which opens its PCC state Jan. 4 against Washington State in Pullman, plans nine of its 16 game round robin conference schedule on the road which makes the Bears' chore a bit tougher.

But, the consensus up and down the coast is that this is a Cal year for a PCC title.

Southern Oregon Sweeps Chico State Hoop Series

Ashland — Southern Oregon college paced by Norman Oliva and Bill Hollingsworth and helped by some timely shooting from Don Reese, Don Jacobson and Chuck Crandall dealt Chico State College their second straight cage setback at the hands of the Red Raiders last night 87-80 in Memorial court's final basketball game.

It was a spine-tingling finish for the Raider court which has had 21 years of basketball played on its surface.

Unofficially, SOC set another record last night as the Red and Black sharpshooters of Coach Ted Schopf scored on 41 out of 53 attempts from the free throw lane. A total of 29 fouls were whistled against Southern Oregon.

The SOC victory, marked the first time in six years that Southern Oregon has taken two straight from Chico State and gave the Red Raiders of the Rogue an overall record of four wins and six setbacks. The double triumph closed out the pre-season schedule for the Ashlanders. They will now move onto the Ashland High school hardwood to open Oregon Collegiate conference competition Jan. 4-5 against Eastern Oregon.

Chico State gave Southern Oregon a rough tussle before three of its regulars, John Wagoner, Mose Mastelotto and Billy Graham left the game in the last five minutes with five personal fouls each.

Chico's Mastelotto and Allan Darby opened the Wildcat scoring from the free throw lane and led 3-0 before Norm Oliva scored on a long push shot from the sidelines. John Wagoner scored on two quick jump shots, and Chico looked determined to even up the series as they led 5-2 before Reese scored on one of his famous long set shots from 25 feet, spearheaded by Graham and Wagoner. Chico State boosted the count to 17-10 before Southern Oregon could call time out and talk things over.

Reese scored on a jump shot. Oliva followed with a pair of free throws. Hollingsworth made a hook shot and Oliva added a bonus toss, as SOC tied the game up at 17-17 with nine minutes played. Don Reese put SOC ahead temporarily with a long set goal only to see Mastelotto jump to the game again with a jump shot from the keyhole. Oliva put SOC back on top 20-19 with a free throw, and Wagoner gave Chico its last chance with a tip in with nine minutes remaining in the first half, making it 21-20 for the Wildcats.

From that point on, the Red Raiders started hitting and Oliva, Hollingsworth, Jacobson and Christensen boosted the Red and Blacks count to 38-30 with three minutes left in the first half. Oliva added five more points and Ron Owings canned a pair of free throws to put Southern Oregon out front 45 to 33 at the midway point.

Chico State came back strong in the second half and narrowed the count to 56-51, only to see the Raiders forge ahead again. With seven minutes remaining, Chico closed the margin to 74-73, as Graham, Mastelotto, and Ellis started connecting for the Wildcats. Southern Oregon used its last time out to talk over the situation, and Coach Schopf's crew breezed to victory No. 4 as Hollingsworth, Crandall, Oliva and Owings all scored to set it up for SOC.

Southern Oregon's Oliva grabbed 23 rebounds and Hollingsworth picked off another 18 to help the SOC cause.

The Raiders canned 41 out of 53 free throws for an average of .770. Chico made 20 out of 30 charity tosses for .670. From the field the Red Raiders made good on 23 of 63 attempts for a .370 shooting average while the Wildcats made good on 30 of 90 shots for a .333 mark from the field.
