

President's Appointments May Include Few Women

 Washington—There's a good chance that a woman or two will be among the new appointments made by President Eisenhower for his second-term team.

Talks at the moment in GOP circles is not specific enough to pinpoint new jobs for them. But there is general agreement that the women—who did a big part in electing Mr. Eisenhower—will figure in the "logical shifting" that comes with a new team.

The speculation about job openings for women ranges from chief of the Children's Bureau, replacing retiring Dr. Martha Eliot, to a possible top diplomatic post.

Chances of a woman cabinet member are held less likely than for additions to the sub-cabinet level or to commissions. Talk of a woman again to head the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW), as did Oleta Culp Hobby, is discounted—even if present chief Dr. B. Folsom resigns, as he is reported to do.

Lesser Post Likely
 It also is felt unlikely that a woman will be appointed to head a major foreign embassy as was Clare Boothe Luce, who recently resigned as ambassador to Italy. Mrs. Luce's successor is a man, James D. Zellerbach. As one high Republican said, "there aren't too many women so well qualified as Clare for as important a post as that one."

But women such as Mrs. Oswald B. Lord alternate U.S. representative of the United Nations and member of UNESCO's Human Rights Commission, are potential appointees to lesser foreign posts.

Since Mrs. Luce's departure, a career diplomat—Mrs. Frances Willis—is the lone woman holding a top job abroad in her post as ambassador to Switzerland.

The Eisenhower administration, like its recent predecessors, has taken pains in the past to put women into federal jobs. During the campaign, the Republican National Committee often cited figures showing 85 women—an all-time high record for any federal administration—have been appointed by President Eisenhower or his cabinet officials to important posts.

Many Job-holders
 That's why some new female faces are expected to join current job-holders such as Miss Frances Knight, chief of the passport division of the State Department, and Mrs. Ivy Baker Priest, Treasurer of the United States. Less well-known job-holders include Mrs. Dorothy McCullough Lee, former mayor of Portland, Ore., and now a member of the Justice Department's board of parole, and Mrs. Raymond Sayre, member of the

National Agriculture Advisory Commission—not to mention 14,000 women serving as postmasters.

Using such figures, some male politicians point out that even with no new appointees, the women seem to be doing all right in the government. Nearly 560,000 women are in the federal government now, they note, about one-fourth of the government's entire civilian personnel.

DeGros; "Continental Dessert Delicacies," by Alice Sidon; "The World's Best Recipes," by Marvin Small, and "The Fireside Cook Book," by James Beard.

In addition to the above material, the library also has numerous books on planning decorations, games stunts and other entertainment for parties.

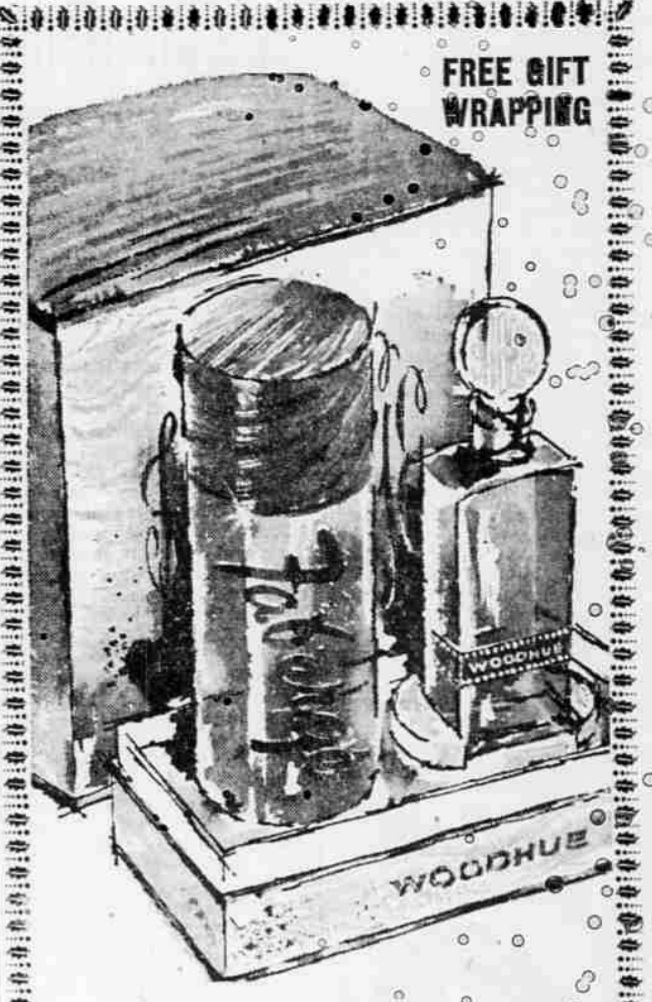
Large Audience Hears Program Given by Hornbrook Children

Lighting Specialist Gives Tips On Taking Holiday Indoor Pictures

Here are a few last minute tips on taking indoor holiday pictures given by Don Mohler, General Electric photographic lighting specialist.

When shooting indoors leave all room lights on. Even better results may be had by adding a flashbulb to give some detail of room surroundings.

When taking a picture of the Christmas tree indoors, try a ten-second exposure for the light, and then flash a flashbulb in the direction of the tree before the camera shutter closes. You may not get the exact image of the tree that your eye sees, but you can get an acceptable print in this way.

Try your indoor tree pictures several ways with and without flash. However, don't attempt a picture with only the tree lights on.

Plan your holiday picture taking to include candid flash shots of holiday festivities including Christmas Eve, Christmas morning gift opening, holiday family dinners and New Year's Eve parties.
