Jam Notes

If the jelly and preserve supply is getting low, here is a remedy—pineapple and strawberry jam, made with canned crushed pineapple and frozen berries. Heat together in a large saucepan 1 can (No. 2) crushed pineapple, 1 package (10-oz.) frozen strawberries, 2 tablespoons lemon juice and 5 cups sugar. Bring to a full rolling boil; cook, stirring for one minute. Remove from heat and stir in 1/2 cup of bottled liquid pectin. Skim and stir for 5 minutes. Pour into 12 sterilized 4-oz. glasses. Seal.

Frozen, Boneless Roasts, Chops Due For Market

Corvallis—Oregon food shoppers may soon be able to buy frozen boneless roasts and chops that have been aged and tendered as the result of a new research development.

A food marketing specialist from Oregon State College, Zelma Ragle, reports that a major meat company has brought out a new line of trimmed, tender frozen meats, packed in aluminum foil wrapped cartons. The meat is trimmed of all bone, except in lamb chops, and excess fat has been removed. Only enough fat remains to protect meat from drying out and losing flavor as it is cooked.

Use of these meats permits easy cooking of retail freezer cases and home freezer units, the specialist explains. The meat is wrapped in a moisture-proof cellophane inner-wrap, placed in a cold waxed carton and covered with a foil over-wrap. Pork chops, beef steaks, specialty or easy-serve items such as sandwich steaks and hamburgers, frozen meat and poultry pies and frozen cut-up chicken, both raw and pre-cooked, are included in the new line.

According to the OSE specialist, the frozen meat may have a leveling off effect on high and low in livestock and meat prices that have faced producers and meat processors over the years. Cost of meats is expected to be slightly more a pound because of all bone and extra fat are removed at the packing plant. Yet, researchers say, once for once meat costs will be little more because of the bone and fat loss in home food preparation.

Home storage for frozen foods has drastically changed food marketing in the past few years, according to Mrs. Ragle. There are more than 30,000,000 refrigerator-freezer compartments and 8,000,000 freezers in today's homes. Frozen foods are special time and work savers for the 12,000,000 homemakers who are employed part- or full-time away from home these days.

Britain's Princess Alexandra To Be Tenty Christmas Day

By ANNE GILBERT United Press Correspondent London—Princess Alexandra, the new and glamorous girl, Princess Alexandra of Kent, soon leaves her teens.

The Princess, seventh in line for the throne of Britain, celebrates her 20th birthday on Christmas Day.

Alexandra, known mostly in the United States as the daughter of the elegant-looking Duchess of Kent, has had to deal with all the standard problems of a girl growing up. But she has inherited her mother's sense of style.

Alexandra, a cousin of Queen Elizabeth II, has seen hard times since the tragic death of her father during active service with the RAF.

She has had strong competition for the limelight from Princess Margaret. And she has had to live the glasshouse life as a royal personage.

Mumps Twice

Now she has taken over the obligations of her position. She has presided over 30 public functions so far this year. She has established her own social set. And she has established a personality and style of her own.

She was six when her father, youngest brother of King George VI, was killed. The Duchess of Kent had to sell property in order to keep going in a style acceptable to the public eye.

"Send and make do" was routine for the princess, who wore her mother's cut-down riding clothes.

She attended an exclusive boarding school for four years, from 12 to 16, where she put

in her time doing chores along with the other girls. "Just call me Mrs. Kent, the char, she would say."

She had the medical distinction of having mumps twice, and at the age of 12 she was awarded a "very highly recommended" in her village riding show.

At 16, the princess was sent to Paris to continue her education. She lived with the family of the Comte de Paris, the pretender to the French throne, and attended a finishing school.

At 18, in 1954, the princess came out and began to perform her first official functions alone. Previously she had accompanied her mother on the royal rounds.

Now, nearing 20, the princess not only has taken on a heavy burden of official responsibilities, but she also is in on the gay parties and suits herself. She went unannounced to a showing of a rock-and-roll film recently to the consternation of the theater management.

She has a large circle of friends which, London social writers claim, is stealing the limelight from the "Wallace collection" (after Billy Wallace) which surrounds Princess Margaret.

According to gossip, the princess is not yet interested in marriage. However, the inevitable rumors have, within the past several years connected her name with Prince Harald of Norway, King Baudouin of Belgium and the eldest son of the pretender of the Spanish throne, Prince Juan Carlos.

But the thing that distinguishes Princess Alexandra and her success is her gaiety. She obviously enjoys her parties; she is relaxed and smiling while attending a meeting of the British Red Cross, of which she is a patron; she skis and skates and plays tennis and, generally, seems happy.
