Steels and Special Issues Pace Market

New York — (U.P.) — Steels and special issues paced stocks sharply higher for the second straight session today.

The rise, which saw individual issues up as much as nine points at their highs, was viewed as a sign the traditional year-end rally was underway.

Dupont was the individual standout, rising more than nine points. Other chemicals were firm. American Cyanamid hit a new high.

Steels put on the best show of strength. Lukens was up more than six points at its high and it hit a new high for the year. Bethlehem ran up around two and also touched a new top. U.S. Steel was at a new high on a gain of around a point.
