ALBERT CUMMINGS
Services for Albert C. Cummings, 69, who died Thursday, will be read by a Christian Scientist in Ashland Mortuary chapel Monday at 10:30 a.m. Committal will be in Mountain View cemetery, Ashland.

Mr. Cummings was born Dec. 15, 1887, in Minnesota. On Dec. 9, 1914, in Kasson, Minn., he was married to Ella F. Smith, who survives. After his marriage, he moved to Wisconsin, and in 1918 to Montana. In 1920 he moved to Medford, and then in 1928 went to Klamath Falls, where he operated a taxidermy shop until 1950, when he moved to Ashland, where he was living at the time of his death.

Faulty Mechanism Blamed for Death

A faulty mechanism in a 12 gauge shotgun was blamed for the fatal wounding Thursday of LeRoy Victor Krieger, 38, Albany, who died in Rogue Valley hospital at 11 a.m., less than an hour after the gun discharged as he was moving it in his car at 502 King st., according to sheriff's deputies.

Chief Deputy Joe Walsh described the defect in the gun as a condition giving the appearance that the weapon was unloaded.

Officers said Krieger had been hunting with friends on Wednesday. Investigation showed the gun had been double checked to make sure it was not loaded when it was placed in a cloth case and into a car. Krieger was loading his car in preparation for returning with his family to Albany. Krieger, his wife and children had been visiting at the George Haas residence when the accident occurred.

According to the report, Krieger was moving the gun to make room for suitcases in the rear of the car when the gun discharged, wounding him in the abdomen. Walsh said the safety mechanism on the gun had apparently been accidentally released before the gun was placed in the car.

Krieger fell against the car seat, which moved forward against the car horn. Krieger's wife, Everal, heard the horn and went to the car where she found her husband wounded.

He was taken to the hospital by Medford Ambulance service about 10:45 a.m. City, county and state police officers participated in the investigation.

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Johnson Enters Local Hospital for Injury

John Fredric Johnson, 20, San Francisco, was confined to Sacred Heart hospital yesterday as a result of chest injuries suffered Wednesday in a car accident about four miles north of Siskiyou lodge on Highway 99.

According to state police, the vehicle Johnson was operating collided with another operated by John P. Ketch 20, a Coast Guardsman stationed at Alameda, Calif. Police said Ketch reported the accident and Johnson failed to remain at the scene. Johnson, who is stationed at Tacoma, Wash., with the Navy, was lodged in the county jail in lieu of \$200 bail for failure to stop at the scene of an accident. He was arraigned in district court Thursday morning and his case was continued. He will appear in court after being released from the hospital. His condition is described as "fair."
