Church Building Boom Predicted During New Year

Washington — (U.P.) — Government experts predict 1957 will bring the biggest church building boom in history.

A record \$775 million was spent during 1956 for new and enlarged churches, synagogues, Sunday school buildings and other religious edifices.

Commerce Department analysts look for an increase of about 13 per cent in religious construction during the coming year. That would make the total outlay a whopping \$875 million.

This is a lot of money to spend on churches, even in America, it is, for example, seven times as much as the 1947 figure, and twenty times the 1937 total.

For churches to take the plunge into building projects during 1957, the Commerce Department has both good news and bad.

It reports that "building materials generally should be in adequate supply, with no more than minor spot shortages."

Construction costs "are expected to continue to rise," but at a somewhat slower rate than in 1956.

Mortgage loans — on which most churches must depend for a substantial share of construction costs — probably will continue to be tight. But churches as a group have achieved an excellent credit rating in recent years, and may have less trouble lining up loans than some private homebuilders. Moreover, churches rarely seek the type of low down-payment, long-term loans which is particularly scarce.
