### Medford Student To Ride On Oregon Float in Rose Parade

Miss Sally Harris, Medford, senior in elementary education, will be one of three Oregon State college coeds to grace the float entered by the Oregon Development commission in the Tournament of Roses New Year's Day parade at Pasadena.

Miss Carol Frisch, Portland senior, and Miss Mary Bell, Rickreall junior, will complete the float's cast for the nationally televised parade.

Miss Harris and Miss Frisch, accompanied by Dean Helen Moore, recently visited the Portland showrooms of White Stag and Pendleton Woolen mills which volunteered to supply apparel in keeping with the motif of the float. Miss Bell was unable to leave the campus due to the pressure of final examinations.

The coeds are being outfitted to represent a logger, angler and skier. The importance of Oregon's recreation and forest industries will be emphasized throughout the float's decor.

To be finished in seasonal flowers and labeled "The First Logger", Oregon's parade entry is being constructed on a giant

beaver tail. A three-dimensional outline of the state at the back will offer Mt. Hood in silhouette. A stream flowing from the base of Mt. Hood to the midpoint of the float will convey the impression that forests play a big part in water conservation and that Oregon possesses abundant water for recreation and power development.

A mountain and forest scene will occupy the rear half of the float and the forward half will feature a forest industries scene.

An estimated 100,000,000 television viewers will see the Oregon float in the line of march at Pasadena and hear Oregon's assets described by network announcers, according to Foye M. Trout of Portland.

Mr. Trout, executive director of the Oregon Development commission, is chairman of the state float committee. Other members are Dean E. B. Lemon, Oregon State college; Robert Ingalls, Corvallis publisher; Director Carl Jordan of the state highway department's travel division, Salem, and Ed Armstrong, administrative assistant to the governor.
