Hornbrook—A wedding of interest in Siskiyou county took place Saturday, December 1 when Miss Sally Jeter, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. Everett Jeter, Hornbrook, became the bride of Richard Allen Campbell, the young man, a member of a pioneer Siskiyou county family, is the son of Mrs. Richard Ansel Campbell and the late Mr. Campbell, and the grandson of Superior Court Judge James M. Allen and Mrs. Allen of Yreka.

The double-ring ceremony was performed at 2:30 o'clock at St. John's Episcopal church at Chico, Calif., with the Rev. J. Raymond Lemert, rector of St. John's, officiating.

Given in marriage by her father, the bride wore a ballerina length dress of rose pink lace fashioned with three-quarter sleeves, round neck, long bodice and full skirt. Her short pink veil was held by a band of white flowers, and she carried a white orchid encircled with stephanotis on a white Bible.

Serving the bride as maid of honor was a friend of high school and college days, Miss Geraldine Churchill, Yreka. She was dressed in a rose pink taffeta gown, ballerina length, and carried a bouquet of small white chrysanthemums. Miss Churchill became a bride herself on December 29 with her marriage to Gary Pittman, Yreka.

James Kleaver of Yreka served as best man, and Bill Jeter, brother of the bride, and James Irvine of Yreka, seated the guests. Both ushers are students at Chico State college.

For the ceremony the church was decorated with white tapers and baskets of white chrysanthemums on the altar. A soprano sister of the bride played the traditional wedding music at the organ.

Following the wedding, a reception was held at the home of Dr. and Mrs. Russell Morris on Sunset drive. Dr. Morris is a professor of education at Chico State, and Mrs. Morris was the bride's sorority advisor at Chico. Mrs. Gerald Conrad of Yreka cut the cake, and Miss Ruth Pedersen, also of Yreka, poured punch. Miss Joanne Burns of Hornbrook poured coffee, while Miss Marilyn Cummins took charge of the guest book. For the reception the rooms were decorated with pink candles and pink camellias.

For her daughter's wedding, Mrs. Jeter chose a steel gray two-piece dress with Dior blue hat and black accessories, and Mrs. Campbell wore sheer beige wool with black accessories. Both mothers wore corsages of white carnations.
