Development Group Denies Charges

Portland — (AP) — The Oregon Development Commission Saturday denied charges leveled by Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.), that a commission industrial brochure had been "stacked" in favor of private power developments.

The Portland Democrat had charged that the commission's brochure "Evaluation of Industrial Opportunities of Oregon," had ignored the role of low-cost federal power in the state's industrial development. He claimed that the commissioners were private power advocates.

In its reply, the commission said "The Development Commission has not been and is not anti-federal power or pro-private power."

The statement continued "The commission is on record recognizing the critical need for additional electric power and has expressed confidence in the ability of both public and private agencies to solve this serious problem."

Police Confiscate Buenos Aires Paper

Buenos Aires — (AP) — Police announced Saturday confiscation of the latest edition of the political weekly newspaper "Consiga" on grounds it printed propaganda favoring the Peronist regime. The confiscation took place Friday as the edition went on sale. The paper, one of several political weeklies which have sprung up in recent months, is strongly nationalistic, pro-labor and pro-Catholic.
