First Witness Against Ambuehl Testifies Today

words while at Omar's and he told her that she should give her 51 shares in the club away as "she wouldn't be needing them where she was going."

The incident was reported to the state police, and 10 days later she left Medford for Los Angeles.

The witness also testified that she had watched Ambuehl purchase \$250 to \$300 worth of narcotics from a man known as Eugene Kelly. She described Kelly as a Los Angeles resident who often visited the Medford area and entered into narcotics exchanges with Ambuehl.

During cross-examination by Edward Kelly, defense attorney, Mrs. Scott explained that she did not know the total number of shares in Stan's Y club when she bought 51 shares for \$3,500 cash. The price was stated to be \$4,000. Although she was secretary of the corporation, she was still regarded as an employee, she stated, and had no voice in the management of the club.

Prior to working for Ambuehl at the club here Mrs. Scott said she had worked for him in several other clubs in Nevada and Oregon.

When asked by the defense attorney if she had ever carried marijuana cigarettes in her purse she replied, "Only when Ambuehl put them there."

Mrs. Scott explained that she had made no attempt to destroy the drugs in her apartment as she didn't wish to handle it in any way. She also expressed fear of Ambuehl and said she might "get two more black eyes" if he discovered the drugs missing from her apartment.

Mrs. Scott took the witness stand about 10 a.m., following an opening statement by District Attorney Walter D. Nunley. Nunley outlined methods by which he would attempt to prove Ambuehl's guilt and referred to Mrs. Scott as a predominant figure in the state's case. Nunley said the state would have seven other witnesses.

560 Major, Minor Offenses Reported

A total of 560 major and minor offenses were reported to the Medford police department during December. Of these, 476 cases were "closed" giving the department an 85 per cent cleared record, according to the monthly report issued by the department.

Major offenses totaled 53 and only 19 were cleared, for a 36 per cent record. This included 39 cases of larceny and theft involving amounts under \$50, ten of which were cleared.

Miscellaneous offenses numbered 507 and 457 were cleared for 90 per cent.

Last year during the same month, the department had 477 offenses of all types reported and closed 399 cases for an 84 per cent record. Fifty-three major offenses were also reported December 1955 with 20 cases cleared for 38 per cent.

Attempts Start to Curb Land Invasion

Washington—U.P.—Rep. Clair Engle (D-Calif.) opened a new attempt today to curb what he calls military invasions of the nation's public lands.

Engle scheduled for early action before the House Interior Committee, which he heads, a bill that would require congressional consent for military land "withdrawals" of more than 5,000 acres.

The bill would enforce local hunting and fishing regulations within the public land military reservations. It also would apply the 5,000-acre limit on land withdrawals to continental shelf oil lands outside the state's tide-lands.

The bill was drafted after long hearings last year. Engle reintroduced it Thursday. He said he would ask the committee to approve it without further hearings.

It was passed by the House last year but didn't come up for Senate action.

Construction of New Plant Progressing

Klamath Falls — Major excavation work has been completed and nearly all building foundations have been poured at the site of the Johns-Manville Corporation's soft board plant north of Klamath Falls.

Foundations for much of the road system around the plant have been graded and work is expected to begin on the storm drainage system soon, according to company officials.

Installation of machinery is expected to begin about March 1. The \$12 million plant is expected to be completed early next year.

Industrial Shares, Railroads Show Gains

New York — (U.P.) — Stocks crossed the magic 500 level again today and in many recent sessions that was a signal for profit taking.

Industrial shares at their high were at their best levels since early September. Railroads enjoyed a good market for a time and held gains better than other sections.

Profit taking hit the recently strong steel shares. Lukens lost more than 5 points and Bethlehem more than 2 points. Others fell well below early highs. The motors were soft all day.

Shipbuilding Issues
Shipbuilding issues sold off after another spurt carried them up 1 to more than 2 points. Amerasia had a rise of more than 4 points at its high. It lost most of it. Shell also was hard hit when the government accused it and two Washington, D.C., taxicab associations of price discrimination in sales of gasoline.

Du Pont touched 192 1/2, up 3 points, and then fell back nearly all the way. American Telephone was driven down from its high of 175 1/2 to 23 1/2.

Best performers in the rails included Louisville & Nashville which touched 91 up 3 1/2 points. Gains of more than a point were set by Atlantic Coast Line and Southern Railway.
