Golfers Seek 20 Spots in Crosby Tiff

Pebble Beach, Calif. — (U.P.) — Approximately 75 golfers teed off today in an attempt to qualify for 20 places remaining in Bing Crosby's 16th annual National Pro-Amateur clambake, which will officially open Friday.

A good share of the attention was riveted on Ken Venturi, making his first professional start after a sensational amateur record.

The young San Franciscan will probably be at his best, for the Crosby tournament is one of the few in which he can win money because PGA rules which require a six months probationary period.

Venturi Qualifies

Crosby officials insisted that Venturi, who was runnerup in the Masters tournament, go through a qualifying round to forestall charges of favoritism on behalf of the new pro.

Tuesday two men won places in the three-day tournament, which ends Sunday.

Virgil Shreeve of San Francisco fired a 70 to best eight pros in the Northern California Pro-Amateur tourney at Fort Ord. Jim Lawson, 21-year-old airman from Tulsa, Okla., qualified by winning the fifth annual Air Defense Command tourney at Pebble Beach on the second hole of a sudden-death playoff.

Lawson was the first enlisted man ever to win the Air Defense command golf crown.

Al Williams, Rogue Valley Country club pro, will be among participants Friday when the Bing Crosby tourney officially begins.

Bears Wallop Stanford; Santa Clara Beats SF Dons

San Francisco — (U.P.) — A "big gun" has suddenly loomed up on the Pacific Coast conference scene but it looks like there will be nothing but hand-to-hand combat in the California Basketball association.

Tuesday night California and Santa Clara went shooting for a pair of "firsts" — and their marksmanship couldn't have been better.

The Bears walloped Stanford, 59-45, for their first victory over the Indians since Howie Dallmar became coach. Dallmar's teams had downed the Bears twice in 1955 and twice in 1956.

Santa Clara scored a 51-47 upset victory over the University of San Francisco which wasn't exactly a first — but it marked the first time a CBA team was able to beat the national champions in 32 attempts.

Meanwhile, St. Mary's came through with a narrow, 74-72, win over Fresno State to remain in a first place tie with Santa Clara in the young season.

Blunt Warning

California's victory was a warning to other PCC teams that the Bears might be pretty hard to handle. Stanford had just split a hair-raising series with the Oregon State Beavers, touted as one of the toughest on the Coast.
