Plans for Vaccine Program Completed

Plans for the free Salk polio vaccine program which will start in the public schools Monday, Jan. 14, have been completed according to Dr. A. E. Merkel, health officer.

The program, sponsored by the Jackson County Medical society, includes children of pre-school and school age and those who have not reached their 20th birthday.

Dr. Merkel said several residents have asked questions regarding the program.

He said the third Salk shot, sometimes called "booster shot," should not be given sooner than seven months after the second shot. He added that the best time for the third shot would be during the period of seven and 12 months after the second shot, but said the last shot could be given as long as two years after the second shot without losing protection given by the first two.

Dr. Merkel explained that the time interval between the first two shots is generally from four

Salesman Denies Ambuehl Purchase Of Narcotics

morning he had taken that equipment on consignment last April.

The state rested its case at 3:30 p.m. Tuesday after the testimony of Manuel Boyes, Portland, director of the state police crime detection laboratory.

Boyes testified he had examined contents of two paper bags taken from Mrs. Scott's Plaza apartment on July 18, the day Ambuehl was arrested as he left the building. Contents of the bags, he said, were tested by two methods and learned to be marijuana.

He added that the bags had been dusted with a fluorescent powder which shows white under ultra violet light. Police officers testified earlier in the trial that the powder had been applied to the sacks prior to Ambuehl's arrest and that the powder was visible on his body and clothing after his arrest.

Boyes brought an ultra violet light into the courtroom, turned it on and held it over the slacks, sport shirt and belt taken from Ambuehl the day of his arrest. He showed the jury parts of the clothing that showed evidence of the powder under the light.

The chemist also testified he had examined contents of the vacuum cleaner bag after state police officer Robert Wiewesiek had vacuumed Ambuehl's car. At the same time, he said, he examined material the officer had removed by hand and which broom from the seat, floor boards, door panel, and ash trays of the car. All the material was found to contain marijuana in varying amounts, he testified.

A vial Ambuehl had allegedly thrown from his car moments before his arrest was also found to contain marijuana, the chemist said.
