Then came his tour with the Mae West muscle-man show, her subsequent headlined firing of him in a love spat and his meeting with Jayne Mansfield in New York.

## Russia Sees Cause Of Eden Resignation

Moscow — (U.P.)—Official Russian news outlets Wednesday attributed British Prime Minister Anthony Eden's resignation to the Anglo-French "failure" in Suez and the Eisenhower Doctrine in the Middle East.

The official Soviet news agency Tass said "political observers in London point out Eden's resignation was caused by the failure of the Anglo-French military venture against Egypt, as well as the proclamation by the United States of the so-called 'Eisenhower doctrine'."

A Radio Moscow commentator said after President Eisenhower's proclamation of the Middle East policy. He spoke also of the "bankruptcy" of British policy in the Middle East.

## O'Hara Backs Tighter Expense Filing Law

Salem — (U.P.)—The recommendation calling for tightening up of the current laws of filing of candidate's expense statements has won the support of David O'Hara, state elections registrar.

## Collapsible Navy Helicopter Unveiled

Palo Alto, Calif. — (U.P.)—The Navy has unveiled a 250-pound collapsible, one-man helicopter which it described as the latest thing in front liaison craft.

The device, called the "Rotocycle," was developed by the Hiller Helicopter Corp. for tactical use by the Marine Corps. A Hiller spokesman said it comes as close to the idea of a "strap-on-back" helicopter as has yet been developed.

The craft is powered by a 4-cylinder opposed, air-cooled engine mounted on the pilot's back. A single rotor 18 feet in diameter provides the lift and a small tail rotor compensates for the torque.

Performance data was not disclosed. The Navy said the Marine Corps would use the Rotocycle for observation, liaison and small unit tactical maneuvers.

## Hitchcock Raps Neuberger's Stand

Portland — (U.P.)—Phil Hitchcock, unsuccessful candidate for the Republican senatorial nomination last May, yesterday criticized Sen. Richard L. Neuberger's stand on Hungarian relief. Hitchcock charged that, "The course Neuberger advocates would not involve merely the risk of war — it would be war."

Speaking at a meeting of Lewis and Clark College Young Republicans, Hitchcock said, "In criticizing the administration's unwillingness to risk war in Hungary, Neuberger fails to realize that there is a vast difference between defending our friends from further Russian aggression on the one hand, and invading Russian-held territory to free subject people on the other hand."

## New Portland Police Chief Shifts Officers

Portland — (U.P.)—Portland's new police chief, William J. Hilbruner, yesterday announced a wholesale transfer of police officers and made it plain that he will hold police captains responsible for all activities under their commands.

The shift in personnel saw 16 lieutenants and five sergeants change duties.

Hilbruner laid his policy squarely on the line to his subordinates. Precinct commanders will be held accountable for all types of law enforcement in districts. Should vice activity crop up which they need help to handle, they will be expected to ask help from the vice detail.

## Milk Production Shift To Eastern Oregon Predicted

Corvallis — (U.P.)—Don Anderson, Oregon State College extension dairymen, told the 63rd annual meeting of the Oregon Dairymen's Association yesterday that it may not be many years before milk production shifts to the eastern section of the state.

Anderson said that Malheur county, with 20,000 head of dairy cattle, now ranks as the state's No. 1 dairy county. Tillamook, long one of the leaders, has 18,000 head of milking stock.

Anderson said that milk producers may find it to their advantage to transport milk across the mountains in bulk transports rather than to haul eastern Oregon hay to the western half of the state.

Herd at Lowest Level  
Oregon dairy herds are now at their lowest level since 1932, Oscar Hagg, Oregon State College dairy marketing specialist, told the convention.

He warned that the consumer milk supply could be endangered unless conditions in the state improve and said producers have a perfect right to bargain for a fair price for their product.

Dr. A. O. Shaw, head of the Washington State College dairy department, told the group that two big problems... the need to increase income by increased production per cow and a more even milk flow throughout the year... are the major ones facing Northwest dairymen.
