

Neil Plumley Selected On Wigwam Wisemen All-American Club

Tornado Gridder on Second Team in Nationwide Poll; 10 Oregonians Mentioned

Neil Plumley, Medford high's all-state and all-conference football tackle last season, has been named to the second team in the Wigwam Wisemen of America's 10th annual national high school All-American selections.

Names of players named to the squad were announced today by Mose Simms, chairman of the Wisemen's football committee. The national poll is sponsored by the Oklahoma City, Okla., and the honorable mention list total 649 names.

Sportswriters of 1,229 daily newspapers, 1,009 radio sportscasters, 307 telecasters, 310 game officials and 123 talent scouts nominated 2,555 seniors from high schools in all 48 states and the District of Columbia.

There were no players from Pacific coast states on the first team. Plumley and Mickey Flynn, Anaheim, Calif., half-back, were the only two westerners named on the second team and Plumley was the only Oregonian to make one of the seven teams.

Oregonians Mentioned
Nine Oregon grid stars rated honorable mention. They were Roger Johnson and Jack Shanley, Marshfield of Coos Bay, Bill Sallee, The Dalles, Dick Smith,

Glide, Jack Temple, McMinnville, and Paul Baugé, Baker, backs, and John Willmott, LaGrande, Bob Lilly, Pendleton, and Ted Hutchinson, McMinnville, linemen.

The 2,978 prep football pickers turned in the most complete coverage ever made in high school football. Simms and the football selecting committee traveled over 30,000 miles, watched some 1300 teams play in the 1956 football season. The opinions of prep talent scouts for colleges, football officials, and especially sports writers were sought, which was a great help in charting the 1956 squad. This made the job of paring the list down to seven first teams much easier than has been the case in the past. Every game played in the nation was taken into consideration.

The 10th Annual Prep All-American Football classic will be played the last part of August, 1957, in Crump Stadium, Memphis, Tenn. All the boys named to the first seven teams and those on the honorable mention list are eligible to play in the game provided they meet the requirements of the selecting committee, the East and West coaches and have graduated from high school or have completed their high school football eligibility.

Notified of his selection last night, Plumley said, "I'm really surprised." He remarked, "It's quite an honor. It's quite a deal." Asked if he would go to Memphis to play in the all-star game, if invited, Plumley agreed that acceptance or rejection might rest on whether he is chosen for the Oregon Class A Shrine All-Star game.

Stanford Break From PCC Urged

Stanford, Calif. — (U.P.) — An editorial in the Stanford Daily urged the school Wednesday to quit the Pacific Coast conference if the present athletic code remains in force.

The editorial, by David Scott, an associate editor, said: "The Pacific Coast conference is going professional and Stanford is the only school that seems to be worried about it."

"In its meeting last week, the conference opened the door to unlimited financial aid by adopting its grant-in-aid for positions."

The pressure from Fred Fagg of USC and Raymond Allen of UCLA and the worry of dropping nine out of 10 bowl games to the Big Ten have been too much for the rest of the schools.

Actually PCC teams have lost 10 out of 11 bowl games.

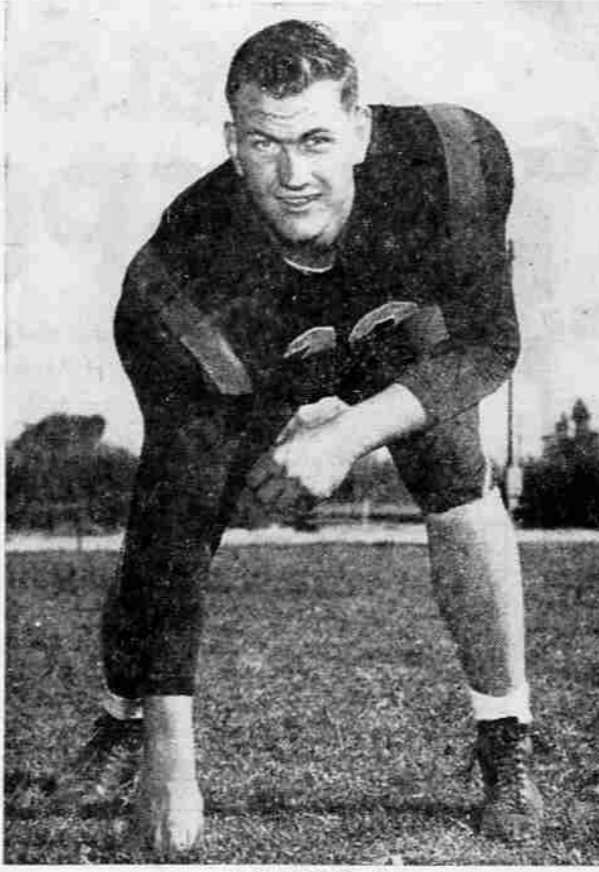
Lovellette Spurs Minneapolis Win

The Syracuse Nationals figured out how to stop big Clyde Lovellette for three periods Wednesday, but until they discovered how to do it for four periods they are going to find it tough to beat the Minneapolis Lakers.

The Nats bottled up the huge center for three periods, permitting him but one basket, but Lovellette led a fourth-period Minneapolis surge to beat Syracuse, 98-88, in the only game played in the National Basketball association.

Lovellette canned 12 points in the final session to wind up the game with 14, considerably below his average, but enough to help the Lakers snap a six-game losing streak.

Oregon State, meanwhile, prepared for an invasion by the Southern California Trojans Friday and Saturday nights in Gill Coliseum.

Coach Steve Belko of Oregon left Forward Ed Bingham of Medford behind. Bingham suffered a foot bruise a week ago. The Ducks are strengthened by the return of veteran Phil McHugh to the team.

California currently leads the PCC with three straight victories.

Coach Slats Gil indicated he would go along with the same quintet which started against Stanford last week when the Beavers split the series. This includes Bob Allord and Dave Gambee at forwards, Gary Goble at center and Jerry Crimins and Ken Nanson at guard.

Elliotts Shake Off Suggestions On Coaching Jobs

St. Louis — (U.P.) — The Elliotts, Pete of Nebraska and Chalmers (Bump) of the University of Iowa staff, have shaken off any suggestions today that they presently are the "hottest" coaches in the new job market at the 51st NCAA convention.

Pete Elliott, who has a \$14,500 a year arrangement at Nebraska for the next three years, and his brother, Bump, are pupils of Oklahoma's Bud Wilkinson. This is why they are hot.

But Pete had "no comment" on reports he is about to sign a contract, possibly for \$17,000 a year, at the University of Washington.

Bump said he had nothing to say, chiefly "because I have been mentioned as a possible choice to fill the head coaching vacancy at California, vacated by Lynn Waldorf. Bump also was reported in line for the Iowa State and University of Missouri posts.

Generally, both coaches and athletic directors are saying nothing about negotiations. There are reports George Briggs, athletic director at Washington, has made an "attractive offer" to Pete Elliott, but Briggs wouldn't admit as much here.
