Air Force Plane Crashes Kill 12

Twelve persons were killed Thursday night in two separate crashes of giant U.S. Air Force planes.

Six crew members of an \$8 million B52 jet bomber were killed when the plane apparently exploded and crashed in rugged country near the U.S. border in New Brunswick.

The plane was reported on a "shake-down" flight from Limestone, Me., about 15 miles from the scene of the crash. A spokesman said the plane was "evidently put in a position beyond its stress capabilities."

Six crewmen were killed and three were injured at Bergstrom Air Force base near Austin, Tex., when their KB29 aerial tanker dropped onto the runway and burned as it came in for a landing.

Among the dead was 2nd Lt. John Anderson Berg, Birkenfeld, Ore.
