Rebounding from a poor showing in his New York debut on Tuesday, Russell tallied 15 points, grabbed 23 rebounds, and batted away a dozen rival shots Thursday night to pace the Boston Celtics in a 98-91 victory over the Fort Wayne Pistons at Fort Wayne.

However, Pettit's 38-point, 29-rebound effort went for naught as his St. Louis Hawks bowed in overtime to New York, 98-84, and Schayes' 40 points were wasted as his Syracuse Nationals lost to the Minneapolis Lakers, 118-110.

In the fourth game Thursday night, Jack George and Paul Arizin scored 23 points each to lead the Philadelphia Warriors to a 112-93 victory over the Rochester Royals.
