Five-Year-Old Daughter of Pastor Dies in Sleep

Joanne Elizabeth Balcomb, 5-year-old daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Raymond E. Balcomb, 27 North Orange st., was found dead at 9 a.m. Saturday, when Mrs. Balcomb entered the child's bedroom to awaken her.

Dr. Balcomb is pastor of the First Methodist church in Medford.

Cause of the girl's death was not known early Saturday and an examination was scheduled, according to Coroner Carlos Morris.

In Good Health

The parents reported Joanne showed no signs of illness during the day Friday, according to city police and sheriff's deputies, who were called to the scene. Dr. Balcomb said he checked on his daughter about 10 p.m., Friday, while she was asleep, and that she appeared to be in good health at that time.

The coroner estimated she had been dead about four hours when the body was found.

Joanne was born Jan. 27, 1951, in Farmington, Mass., and had lived in Medford for the past three years.

Private Services

Survivors in addition to her parents include two sisters, Bernice and Rosemary, a brother, Gene, and maternal grandparents.

Private committal services will be held Monday at Meeker Memorial chapel of the First Methodist church. Dr. C. Douglas Hayward of San Mateo, Calif., will officiate. A public memorial service will be held later.

In lieu of flowers, the family has suggested that contributions in her name may be made to the memorial fund of the First Methodist church, 607 West Main st., Medford.
