Morse Unconvinced Of Need for Doctrine

Washington — (UP) — Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.), said yesterday this country should not "spill American blood for Arabian oil" in developing a policy toward the Middle East.

He said that he so far has not been "convinced" of the need for the new "Eisenhower Doctrine." The plan calls for the use of American troops, if necessary, to protect the Middle East from Communist aggression.

Another senator who voiced doubts about the president's plan was Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.), who frequently has clashed with Morse in the Senate.

McCarthy said he could not agree that Congress should "abdicate its duty" by giving Mr. Eisenhower standby authority to use U. S. forces.

REFUGEES RETURN

London — (UP) — The Czechoslovak official news agency said today 10,000 Hungarian refugees have returned to Hungary from Austria and other Western countries in the last five weeks. The Czech broadcast monitored here said 70 to 80 refugees are returning to Hungary each day.

Smut Said Cause Of \$5 Million Damage in 1956

Portland — (UP) — Smut — Pacific Northwest wheat growers' public enemy No. 1 — claimed \$5 million damages again in 1956.

Dr. C. S. Holton, U. S. Department of Agriculture plant pathologist, said in a report presented to a regional smut-control committee the percentage of wheat graded smutty was down 7.3 per cent from the previous year's figure but the monetary loss was the same because infestations were more severe.

Based on Replies
The report was based on replies of a questionnaire distributed through the Pacific Northwest Grain Dealers Association. Figures were compiled on a bushel basis from grain received at elevators in Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

Another report compiled by the USDA Grain Division from records of handlers who sample each grower's consignment, placed the smut figure at 30.3, but it did not indicate the number of bushels sampled.

Nevertheless, other reports showed that the black fungus condition was worse in Washington and Idaho than in Oregon. Idaho, second in production, was first in smut percent-

age. Washington, the largest producer, was second.

Dr. Holton's survey showed that Elmer wheat led the list in both production volume and smut percentage, with more than half of that variety graded smutty.

However, the report indicated the future looked brighter because there was an increased seeding of the smut-resistant club variety Omar wheat, the report said.
