Good Business Level Predicted for 1957

Portland — U.P. — There will be a good level of business in 1957 but the year will have more than its usual quota of uncertainties, C. B. Stephenson, president of the First National Bank of Portland, predicted here yesterday.

Stephenson said there will be "few if any foreseeable increases in housing starts in 1957" in his "Business Forecast of 1957" delivered before the Portland Chamber of Commerce yesterday.

Consumer spending will be a little higher in 1957, Stephenson predicted, and so will government spending.

The two big and all important problems to be watched will be the Middle East and inflation, Stephenson warned.

Communists Suffer Defeat in France

Paris — U.P. — Communists in France's strongest Communist district suffered heavy defeat in their first elections since the Hungarian revolt, results of a National Assembly bi-election showed today.

Voters in the largest single electoral district in France went to the polls Sunday to elect a successor to Radical lower house member Vincent de Moro-Giafferri, who died in November.

Julien Tardieu, 60-year-old company administrator and municipal counselor, running as an independent, received 101,293 votes, compared to only 62,787 for Communist candidate Lucien Monjaux, although the Left Bank district comprising 547,690 voters normally swings heavily to the Communist candidate in any election.

Virginia has given the nation eight sons who became Presidents of the United States. They are Washington, Jefferson, Madison, Monroe, Harrison, Tyler, Taylor and Wilson.

Boy, 17, Confesses Slaying Young Girl

Matador, N. D. — U.P. — Authorities today planned further questioning of a 17-year-old pin boy who said admitted strangling Rosemary Mertes, 14, shortly after leaving a bowling alley where they both worked.

Authorities identified the youth as Harold Joseph Nepper, who also was the first person questioned about the slaying. Nepper, a high school senior at nearby Hankinson, worked as a pin boy and the dead girl as a foul spotter in the bowling alley.

Officials said Nepper had not offered any reason for the crime. The confession climaxed a week of increasing tension that saw more than 100 of the town's 138 residents brought in for questioning. Neighbors were silent about the atrocity, fearful that one of their friends might be the murderer.

Movie Wardrobe Chief Dies in Japan

Kyoto, Japan — U.P. — Leon Roberts, 58, chief of the Warner Brothers wardrobe department, died of a heart attack today during the filming here of the movie "Sayonara."

Roberts was stricken while on location. He was on a truck examining costumes to be used in the picture.

He died in the Kyoto Red Cross Hospital.

Roberts arrived here recently to supervise the costumes to be worn by the cast, starring Academy Award winner Marlon Brando and Miss Miko Taka of Los Angeles.

Sayonara is a romantic story of an American flier and a Japanese revue girl of famed Takarazuka Opera, based on a novel by James Michener.

Klamath Indians Issue Ultimatum
 Klamath Falls — U.P. — The Klamath Indian tribe issued an ultimatum to the Klamath County Bar Association yesterday, threatening to boycott the association if legal fees levied in guardianship cases are not reduced by the end of this month.

A tribal interim committee issued the statement at a meeting of tribal leaders and representative bar association committee.

Spokesmen for the bar association replied that higher legal fees for Indian guardianship cases were justified in that they required more work than ordinary cases.

The bar association presented a new proposal after a noon recess stating that the group would be willing to follow either the minimum rate schedule of the County Bar Association or of the Oregon State Bar. It was pointed out, however, that in either case attorneys would be entitled to payment for any extra work performed in handling Indian guardianships.

Angry Father-To-Be Punches Young Lover

Ashton-Under-Lyne, England — U.P. — Love and marriage tangled over a telephone here Monday with both physical and financial consequences.

Eric Monton, a married insurance man, paid a \$5 fine for breaking the nose of the lover, 18-year-old Thomas Cooper.

Monton told the court he waited nervously 20 minutes outside the telephone booth to call the hospital where his wife was to give birth. Cooper was inside pleading with his girl friend to patch up a quarrel.

Finally Monton said he could stand the suspense no longer. He pulled open the door, dragged Cooper out and slugged him.

Mrs. Monton and child were reported doing fine.

No Clues Found in McDonald Kidnaping

Hollywood — U.P. — Chief of Police William H. Parker said today an exhaustive investigation of actress Marie McDonald's kidnap story had produced "absolutely negative results."

Parker said his detectives had virtually reached a dead-end after working on the bizarre case for more than a week.

"We have checked out every bit of information in the case and have failed to find any positive evidence," Parker said. "We can neither substantiate nor disprove her story."

Parker has said that he would like to clear up what he considers to be discrepancies in Miss McDonald's story of how she was abducted from her nearby Encino home Jan. 4 by two men and released some 24 hours later on the desert.

Miss McDonald said tearfully Monday she was tired "of being treated like a criminal by the police" and offered a \$5,000 reward for information leading to the arrest of the two men she charged kidnaped her.

Russian Attache Expelled From U. S.

Washington — U.P. — The United States has expelled an assistant Soviet military attache for "improperly" buying electronic equipment and trying to purchase "classified" military information, it was announced today.

In a terse note delivered Monday night, the United States declared Maj. Yuri P. Krylov persona non grata unwelcome and demanded his "immediate departure."

The State Department said, in announcing the ouster, that Krylov had improperly purchased electronic equipment.

"On various occasions, Maj. Krylov had purchased such materials through American intermediaries," the department said. "In addition, Maj. Krylov had attempted to purchase classified military information."

In the note itself, the United States said those were "highly improper activities incompatible with his diplomatic status."

Robert Montgomery Rumored for Navy Post

Washington — U.P. — Navy Secretary Charles S. Thomas today declined to confirm or deny reports that Robert Montgomery is being considered for a post as assistant secretary of the Navy.
