New York — (U.P.) — Stocks advanced today but the gain restored only a fraction of the more than \$2.5 billion wiped from stock values in the two previous sessions.

Stocks finished below their highs for the day on late modest selling. Steels stood out on the upswing, made on reduced volume. Sugar, shipping, metals and selected aircrafts and utilities also highlighted.

Crucible Steel was up around three points at its high. Bethlehem, Wheeling, Lukens, and Youngtown all boasted gains of a point or more before the decline set in.

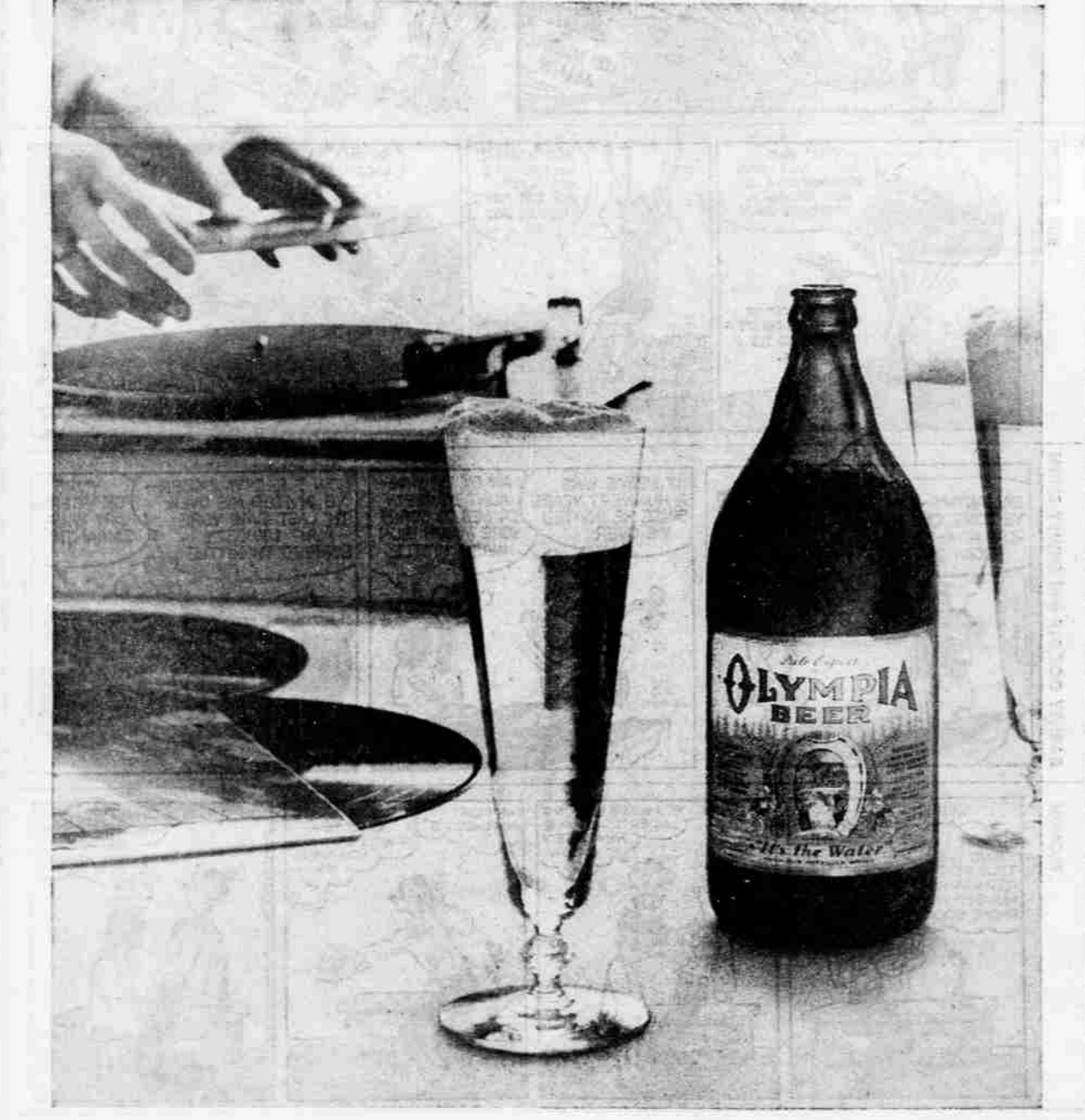
FIVE-DAY FORECAST
