Firemen Seek Two Missing in Explosion

West Peoria, Ill.—U.P.—Firemen dug through the ruins of a two-story commercial and residential building today in search of two persons missing in a blast which killed two men and injured five other persons.

The missing are Robert J. Einfeldt, 32, and his 11-year-old son, Robert, residents of a second-floor apartment.

Einfeldt's father-in-law, John J. Heitzman, 61, owner of the building, and Perry Traub, 40, operator of a market in the building, were killed in the double explosion Wednesday night which ripped apart the structure and Heitzman's adjoining home. It was believed the explosion was caused by a gas leak the two victims were investigating at the time.

Northwest Dams Give Record Power Output

Portland—U.P.—Federal hydroelectric dams in the Pacific Northwest last night generated more power than at any previous time in their history.

Bonneville Power Administration officials said the prolonged cold spell was responsible for a generation of 4,830,000 kilowatts from 5 p.m. to 6 p.m. yesterday. The new peak, however, did not strain resources of the northwest power pool, spokesmen said.

Previous peak was attained during another cold spell Dec. 6 when 4,795,000 kilowatts were generated.

Medford Man Arraigned In District Court

Joseph George Matvey, 52, of 1756 North Riverside ave., was arraigned in district court this morning on a charge of grand larceny and was given until Friday to obtain counsel and enter a plea.

District Judge Rawles Moore ordered Matvey lodged in the county jail until his court appearance at 10 a.m. Friday.

Nautilus Scheduled For First Refueling

Washington—U.P.—The atomic submarine Nautilus is scheduled to be refueled for the first time this spring after sailing more than 55,000 miles in two years on its original load of nuclear power.

The Navy announced the refueling date Wednesday night on the eve of the anniversary of man's first propulsion by atomic power two years ago. The Nautilus got underway on nuclear power for the first time Jan. 17, 1955, at Groton, Conn.

In the refueling, the uranium core of the Nautilus reactor will be removed and a new core of enriched uranium installed. The old core will be sent to a reactor test station at Arco, Idaho, for "examination and to reclaim unused uranium."

Blast at Roller Rink Injures 15 Persons

Algona, Iowa—U.P.—Fifteen persons were injured Wednesday night when leaking natural gas touched off an explosion in a roller rink. Nine of the injured were hospitalized.

Three persons were reported in serious condition at St. Ann's hospital here. The others suffered fractures and cuts and were hurt less seriously.

The blast rocked the Star roller rink about 10:25 p.m. as the proprietor prepared to close it. The blast did not damage the building badly but the injury toll was high because it exploded near the entrance where a large number of persons had congregated before leaving.

The fire chief said the natural gas leaked out of a main about 20 feet from the front of the building. It seeped under a corner of the frame structure and gathered under the floor.

Air Force Plane Crashes in Alaska

Fairbanks, Alaska—U.P.—A four-engine Air Force weather reconnaissance plane crashed and burned today shortly after taking off from Eielson Air Force Base and Alaska Territorial Police said there were no survivors.

It was not known immediately how many men were aboard the plane, a modified B50 bomber, but Air Force officers said such a craft normally carried a crew of 12.

The plane belonged to the 58th Weather Reconnaissance Squadron at Eielson AFB, 26 miles south of here. Officers at the airfield said it was starting a "loon flight" of weather reconnaissance mission over the Aleutian Island chain and the Bering Sea when the crash occurred.

Rayburn Supports Eisenhower Doctrine

Washington—U.P.—President Eisenhower's Middle East "doctrine" won a powerful congressional ally today when Speaker Sam Rayburn threw his support behind both the economic and military phases.

Rayburn, previously reported to be lukewarm or even opposed to the economic aid, told reporters he thinks it would be "judicious for Congress to go along" with Mr. Eisenhower's whole program.

The Democratic leader, who wields great influence in the House, said he favors putting the economic and military powers sought by the President in the same bill, instead of splitting them into two measures as some Democrats have proposed.
