GOLD HILL Children Are Vaccinated

Gold Hill—According to Gilbert Mack, principal, 50 per cent of the students enrolled in the Gold Hill schools received the free Salk anti-polio vaccine at Hanby school Tuesday morning, Jan. 15. A great number of the students vaccinated were from the upper grades and received their first shot of the vaccine. More than 40 pre-school children were vaccinated.

Dr. Stanley Brown gave the vaccine. He was assisted by his wife, who is a nurse, and the school health nurse, Miss Elizabeth McCallard, from the health department. Others helping with the inoculations were Mrs. Paul Molloy, Mrs. Delores Walker and Mrs. Floyd Taylor.
