Stock Market Trading Sets Record for 1957

New York — (UP) — Stocks met support in the late trading today after rails had been hammered down to a new low since Oct. 18, 1955, and industrials since Nov. 30, 1956.

Trading set a new high for 1957. The first group to meet support was the steels and the rally came only after Bethlehem had touched 178 1/2 off 3 1/4; U.S. Steel 63 1/4 off 1 1/2; and Crucible 68 1/2 off 2 1/2.

Chrysler was carried up a point late in the session after a decline of a fraction. General Motors made a new low and rallied only a trifle. Southern Railroad stood out in its session with a one-point rise, helped by a TV tip.
