## Seattle Man Held In Bomb Threat Hoax

Seattle (U.P.)—Kenneth J. Wieter, 29, Seattle, was arraigned before U.S. Commissioner John A. Burns here yesterday and charged with making a false bomb threat which forced an airliner to stop in San Francisco Saturday night.

Wieter requested a preliminary hearing, which was scheduled for 1:30 p.m. Thursday. He was ordered held in lieu of \$5,000 bond.

Wieter is accused of telephoning the United Air Lines reservation desk here and reporting that a bomb had been planted aboard a plane flying non-stop from Seattle to Los Angeles. The plane was halted at San Francisco where a search revealed no bomb.
