## Marjorie Smith Refused Custody

Portland — (U.P.) — Final scene in Portland's dramatic Kermit Smith bomb murder case was enacted in San Francisco yesterday when an appellate court judge denied the attempt of Smith's widow to regain custody of her child. Marjorie Smith, acquitted of complicity in her husband's murder, had fought her husband's sister, Mrs. Helen Hightower, for custody of the four-year-old daughter of the slain attorney. Mrs. Smith lost the initial case in a California court and yesterday's decision upheld the lower court ruling. Victor Laurence Wolf is serving a life prison term for Smith's murder. Latest reports said Mrs. Smith was now living in Bethlehem, Pa.

## Pets Should Be Kept Isolated After Bite

Dr. A. Erin Merkel, public health physician, today reminded residents to keep dogs, cats and other pets isolated and under observation for a period of 10 to 14 days after someone has been bitten by the animal.

He said the bite may result in rabies and treatment needed for the human victim. However, he noted, many people dispose of the animal immediately after the bite, making it impossible to determine whether or not the animal was suffering from rabies.

In such cases it is advisable to treat the human for rabies whether or not he has been infected. Dr. Merkel pointed out that this treatment is expensive and if not administered with extreme caution, can sometimes be dangerous.

The physician recommended watching the animal for signs of illness during the isolation period. If the animal becomes ill or dies the health department in the courthouse or a veterinarian should be notified.

If the animal dies, he said the body should be sent to the state health department laboratory to determine whether or not rabies caused death before treatment to the human victim is started.

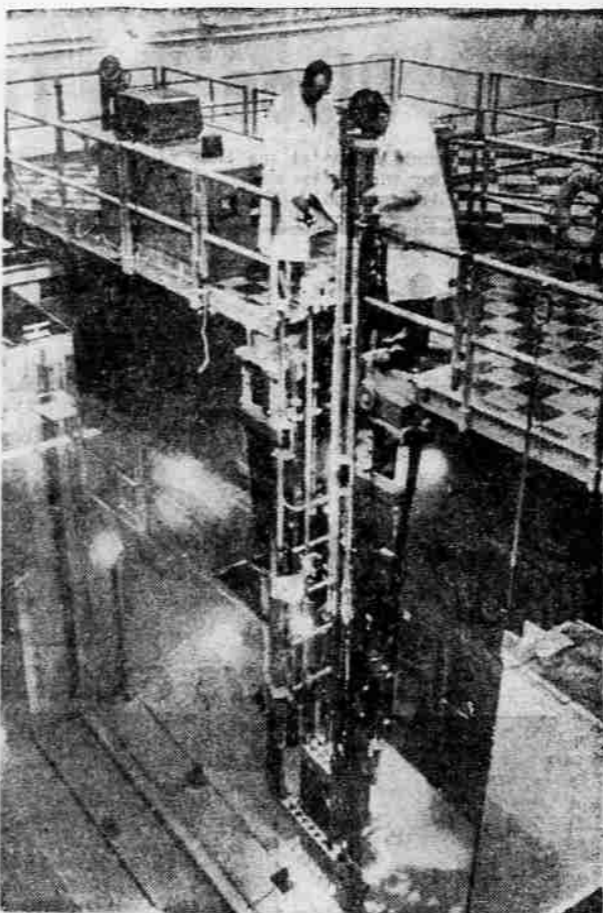
## Missing Air Force Tanker Plane Found

Rome, N.Y. — (U.P.) — The wreckage of a KC97 Air Force tanker plane was found today in rugged Adirondack terrain near North Lake, N.Y., by an Air Force helicopter, state police reported. It was not determined immediately if there were any survivors among the seven men aboard.

State troopers were en route to the sparsely populated area on foot. The wreckage was discovered by one of 12 helicopters searching with 15 Air Force planes. The plane has been missing since Tuesday night when it was scheduled to land at Griffis Air Force Base here.

**REACTOR DEDICATED**—The first nuclear reactor in the nation's capital was dedicated at Naval Research Laboratory in Washington. ## Manhattan Fire Hurts Three Persons

New York — (U.P.) — A five-alarm fire raged through three commercial buildings in downtown Manhattan for two hours today before it was brought under control. Three firemen and two other persons were injured, none seriously. Water from fire hoses froze into weird icicle patterns on the blazing buildings, formed a slippery sheet beneath fireman's feet and coated firemen and on-lookers with freezing spray in the 16-degree temperature. Smoke from rags and paper stored in the five-story warehouse in which the fire broke out cast a heavy pall over downtown Manhattan and hampered fire fighters.

to Steve Crippen for Bengtson's write-in campaign. He said when Bengtson announced his withdrawal from the district attorney's race he authorized Schempp to obtain the money from Crippen and add it to the funds he has solicited from other tavern owners. He told Examiner Detloff he did not know contributing to a political campaign was in violation of a statute for an OLC license, as most of the other tavern operators had testified.

Representing tavern owners were Warren Lesseg, James Main, Haviland, C. W. Reames and Bengtson. Examiner Detloff asked the attorneys to submit legal briefs on the matter to the OLC as soon as possible. He also said he would go over testimony from the hearing and make a recommendation to the OLC. OLC members will then decide on whatever action, if any, will be taken. A decision on the matter will probably be reached in about a month, he said.

## Entertainers Object To Ruling on Taxes

Washington — (U.P.) — A group of lawyers representing some of the nation's biggest name entertainers argued today that the Internal Revenue Service tax ruling will bring financial ruin on their clients. The attorneys, most from California and New York, represented such movie and television stars as Marilyn Monroe, Lucille Ball, Desi Arnaz, Danny Thomas, Danny Kaye, Jackie Gleason and Perry Como, all in the high income brackets. The Internal Revenue service has ruled tentatively that such stars cannot incorporate themselves and pay only corporate income taxes on their earnings. This has become a fairly common practice in recent years.

## Democrats To Hold Conference in S.F.

Washington — (U.P.) — The Democratic National Committee announced today that more than 1,000 Democrats are expected to take part in a two-day social and economic conference at San Francisco next month.

The conference will be held Feb. 15-16 in conjunction with a meeting of the National Committee and the Democratic National Advisory Committee. The full National Committee will be meeting for the first time west of the Mississippi.

Adlai E. Stevenson, 1956 Democratic presidential nominee, will address a fund raising dinner ending the two-day conference.
