Medford Winners In Homemaking Contest Announced

Two girls have been named Betty Crocker Homemakers of Tomorrow in Medford. They received the highest scores in their schools on a written examination of homemaking knowledge and attitudes taken by graduating high school girls.

The local school winners are Miss Joann Agnes Doe of Medford Senior High school and Miss Barbara Joanne Lickess of St. Mary's High school.

Their examination papers now will be entered in competition with those of 146 other school winners to name this state's candidate for the title of All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow and will also be considered for the runner-up award in the state. For their achievement, they will each receive an award pin designed by Trifari of New York.

Each state winner will receive a \$1,500 scholarship and an educational trip with her school advisor to Washington, D.C., colonial Williamsburg, Va., and New York City. A \$500 scholarship will be awarded the runner-up girl in each state. The school of the state winner receives a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica.

More than 300,000 young women in 11,636 of the nation's public, private and parochial schools participated in the third annual Search sponsored by General Mills. The program is designed to assist schools in education for home and family living and to emphasize through a sound scholarship award program the personal qualities and sense of values necessary to successful homemaking. A total of \$106,000 in scholarships will be awarded.

The national winner will be named May 2 at the American Table banquet in the Waldorf Astoria Hotel, New York City. The scholarship of the All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be increased to \$5,000.
