Society Welcomes Eight Members; Events Announced

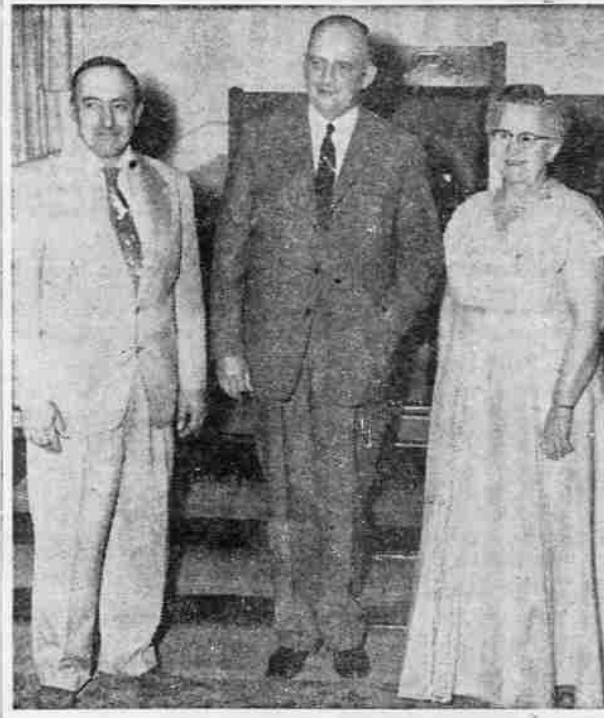
Eight new members signed the membership register of Women's Society of Christian service in a special service held January 23, in Meeker chapel of First Methodist church.
