Judge Considering Helser Motion

San Francisco—U.P.—Federal Judge Louis E. Goodman took under submission Friday a motion by J. Henry Helser & Company to dismiss charges the firm misrepresented investments in letters to prospective clients. The judge gave no indication when he would rule on the motion. He still must hear a motion by the Securities and Exchange Commission for a permanent injunction against the Helser firm. The SEC charged Helser deliberately continued a program of misrepresentations in defiance of a Federal Court order issued in 1935 which directed the firm to revise its relationships with clients.

Helser attorney Robert E. Burns told the court the letters in question were in "areas of fair comment" and were based on performances which were on record "at the time the statements were made."

He said the letters were based on a survey of individual accounts and on a company survey which showed an average return of nine per cent over the life of some 3,122 accounts.

Corvallis Council Has Meter Problem

Corvallis—U.P.—City councilmen were full of ideas for the relief of a harassed Corvallis housewife but Mrs. Charles Hamilton considered none of them very practical.

Washington — (U.P.) — Back stairs at the White House: It would be quite a planning problem if King Saud of Saudi Arabia turned out to be the stickler for Arab customs his late father, King Ibn Saud, was.

King Saud arrives here Wednesday as President Eisenhower's guest and, with his large party, will stay at Blair House. His father would not compromise in the slightest when he met the late President Roosevelt in 1945 aboard the cruiser Quincy while FDR was en route home from the Yalta conference.

Ibn Saud brought his own food, including a flock of bawling sheep, and cooks, plus a ceremonial coffee maker and the keeper of the king's purse. His
