# Fish, Game Resources Contribute to Large Industry in America

U.S. fish and game resources contribute to a \$3 billion a year industry in which 25 million Americans participate, C. A. Shepard, of the state game commission here told the Medford Rotary club.

Speaking at the luncheon meeting at the Jackson hotel, Shepard said that a half-million Oregonians fish and hunt, and their spending for licenses, tackle, guns, camping equipment, gasoline and accommodations make a sizeable contribution to the economy of this state.

Population gains in Oregon in recent years have brought about a "two way squeeze," the speaker said. As more land is settled, the natural habitat of game is reduced while added demand obviously follows for more deer, ducks, quail and pheasants. Improved management and wider public education provide the only solution to the problem.

Acquire Tolerance

As civilization extends into remote areas, game must acquire adaptability and tolerance to survive, Shepard pointed out. The blacktail deer common to this area offers an example of game that has both desirable qualities. Regulation of hunting and fishing seasons and size of bag or limits are vitally important tools of game and fish management.

Chuckers, gray-colored game birds larger than quail and smaller than pheasants, have been successfully introduced in the higher desert areas of eastern Oregon.

Shepard explained the importance of opening classified areas for after-season deer hunting, especially in such areas as southern Oregon where deer multiply faster than they are killed by hunters. In some sections of

### Weasels Battling Toward Rescue

Chama, N.M. — (U.P.) — Army Weasels towing sleds fought their way up the Southern Colorado Rockies today in an attempt to reach some 60 railroad workers marooned by 21 feet of snow on 10,022-foot Cumbres Pass.

The Weather Bureau said more snow was expected in the vicinity of the pass today. The weather remained cold.

A score of men, the crew of a Denver & Rio Grande Railway train which was stalled on the pass Saturday, have passed four nights in a five-room section house on top of the pass.

The other 35 or 40 men are on two rescue trains which were trapped by snow slides, about three miles from the section house, Monday night.

The men were in no immediate danger.

The Weasels, web-tracked snow vehicles from Camp Hale, Colo., tried to reach the stranded railroaders Tuesday. But the Weasels could not break a trail the full 13 miles from Chama to the pass summit before dark.
