Under the program, recruits desiring aviation duty are guaranteed that upon completion of boot camp and individual combat training, they will be assigned to an aviation school for training.

Bandit Holds Up Downtown Portland Bank Late Friday

Portland—(U.P.)—A slender, nervous bandit held up the crowded SW 6th Ave. and Morrison St. branch of the First National Bank in downtown Portland a half hour before closing time Friday, escaping with \$930.

Police said a search was maintained throughout the night but no definite trace of the holdup man had been turned up.

The robber hid up to the cage operated by Teller Ann Davis in the crowded bank lobby and thrust a note through the window to her. "This is a holdup. Give me your money," the note read.

The teller said she did not see a gun but the bandit kept his hand concealed in his coat in a menacing manner, indicating that he was armed.

Starts to Comply
She started to comply with his request and pulled open her cash drawer. The man spotted a \$50 and \$100 bill in the drawer and demanded she hand them over.

"Just a minute, I will get it for you," Mrs. Davis said. Chief Teller Alice M. Merth who was in a neighboring cage overheard the remark and ascertained a holdup was in progress.

The bandit suddenly became alarmed and thrust his arm through the cage window grabbing up a fistful of \$10 bills and running out of the building.

Police described the robber as a Negro man, about 30 years of age, wearing khaki clothing, in need of shave and sporting a moustache. He ran from the building and lost himself in the crowd on SW 6th Ave.
