New York — (U.P.) — Bob Feller, who retired after a meteoric 21-year career, Saturday left his fellow players something to remember him by — a pension plan equal to anything ever written in America.

Commissioner Ford Frick revealed the details of the new five-year plan, made possible by \$16 million in revenue from All Star Game and World Series radio and television rights, and then paid tribute to the former Cleveland Indian fireballer's all-important role in bringing it about.

"I don't want to take anything away from men like Robin Roberts and Marty Marion who worked on it," said Frick. "But everything considered — it was Feller who played the tremendous role."

Other Liberal Benefits

The plan, approved Friday by the 16 major league club owners, provides for increases in benefits of \$17,500 per month for each of the first 10 years of major league service and an increase of \$10 a month for each succeeding 10 years. Liberal insurance, disability and hospitalization benefits are also included.
