Portland—The recipe which won Miss Dianne Illingworth of Portland a prize in the 1936 annual Pillsbury grand national bake-off, has been released by the company.

Miss Illingworth, a student and part-time employee of the Oregon Dairy council, made an apple skillet cake for the bake-off. Her original recipe follows: 3 tbs. butter; 2/3 cup brown sugar, firmly packed; 2 medium apples, peeled, cored and sliced; 1/3 cup raisins; 3/4 cup grated sharp Cheddar cheese.

Melt butter in 10-inch skillet. Blend in 2/3 cup brown sugar. Arrange apple slices on top of brown sugar-butter mixture. Sprinkle with raisins and cheese. Sift flour; resift with baking powder and salt.

Woman Scientist Also Good Cook

By GAY PAULEY United Press Correspondent New York — (U.P.) — Dr. Chien Shiung Wu, renowned for her work in physical science, is pretty expert at domestic science.

Her associates call her the outstanding woman physicist in the world today.

The Chinese-born Dr. Wu had a hand in development of the atomic bomb. She was the only woman of the seven-member research group which recently announced that new findings had upset a 30-year-old basic concept of physics — the conservation of parity law.

Yet, to meet and talk with Dr. Wu, you'd hardly suspect that her dainty frame cloaks a giant mind. She is no more than five feet tall, is slim, and pretty with the dark eyes and olive skin of her race.

No "ivory tower" scientist, she can discuss recipes as readily as equations and classes herself an "average type" housewife.

I apologized during our talk for my ignorance of physics. "My dear," she smiled, "none of us knows much."

Dr. Wu, who is in her late 30's, is married to another physicist, Dr. Luke Yuan, of the Atomic Energy Commission's Brookhaven Laboratories on Long Island. The couple has a nine-year-old son.

Dr. Wu said she wasn't even thinking about whether the boy also will become a scientist. "I want him to have some fun while he can," she said with a laugh.

The Yuans — she uses her maiden name professionally — live in an apartment only a block from the Columbia campus. Dr. Wu said since her husband gets home only for week ends, she puts off most of her cooking until then.

"We physicists are two classes of animals," she said. "Theoretical and experimental." Einstein was a theoretical physicist. . . she and her husband are experimental.

"But our work isn't the same at all," she said. "He's in high energy. . . I'm in low. He works with billions of electrons. I'm just in the millions."

Todd gave his bride a diamond-studded bracelet, ear ring and ring set valued at \$80,000 for a wedding present. Asked what she gave him, Miss Taylor replied, "My eternal love."

Faint Stars Near Capella Form Group Known as Kids

By FAY BENTLEY "Is there a group of stars known as the Kids? One of our boys who has to report on this sky figura has been unable to discover what and where it is," spoke a scout leader over the telephone.

A tiny triangle of three faint stars located close to the brilliant star Capella, was designated by the Arabs as the Kids. Capella, third brightest star to be seen from mid-northern latitudes, and fifth brightest in the heavens, is a giant sun of first magnitude and the alpha or brightest star in the constellation Auriga the Charioteer.

From this part of the world only two stars brighter than Capella are visible. These are, Sirius, the Dog Star, which forms the head of Canis Major, and Vega, in Lyra, the Harp.

A line through the three stars forming the belt of Orion, now high in the southeast, if continued downward and to the left will reach Sirius the brightest star in the sky. About 6 p.m. Vega can be seen flashing very low on the horizon in the extreme northwest, but soon disappears.

Canopus and Alpha Centauri the other two stars with greater magnitude than Capella are only visible from the very most southern part of the United States or the southern hemisphere.

To dwellers in any spot approximately 45 degrees north latitude, Capella is visible during 10 months of the year. In fact, this star is almost circumpolar and, given clear skies, is easily seen describing a huge arc across the northern heavens, from the first of September as it dances up on the northeastern horizon, to the last of July when it flashes and scintillates on the far northwestern sky line.

Ancient people called Capella the shepherd's star as their monotonous night vigil was somewhat relieved by interest in this glorious golden sparkler. To many Hebrews Capella represented the Good Shepherd who was to come and redeem the world.

The sailors, also, were fascinated by this giant sun which hung low in the east when autumnal storms were due, and shone high overhead early in the winter evenings. During stormy weather Capella can usually be seen if any stars at all are visible. The "Storm Star" was loved by sailors as the goats were believed to be on the alert to save shipwrecked seamen.

Probably the shepherds influenced the naming of this star, for Capella is a Latin word meaning she-goat. In keeping with the name, the Arabs considered the three faint stars forming the miniature isosceles triangle near Capella to be the

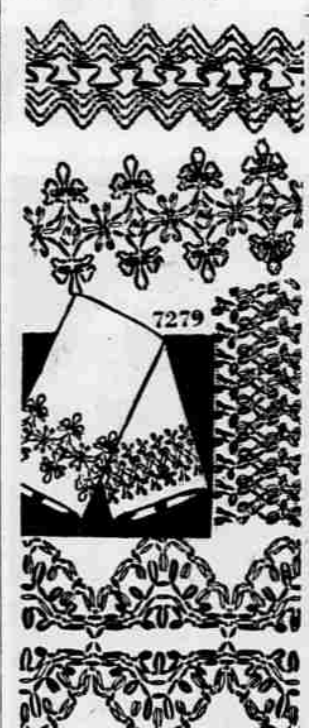
