Medford high hoopers hit pot shots from long and mid-range with good consistency to wreck the effectiveness of Grants Pass zone defense Saturday night as they whipped the Cavemen 64 to 46 for a two-game week end sweep in the Southern Oregon conference.

Larry Perkins and Dick McLaughlin were the main gunners as happy passing and maneuvering set the Tornado up for the firing over the Cavemen. Perkins hit from out front and McLaughlin from the side and front, helping the Pear capital quintet to go in front and stay there early in the game.

To their swishing of the nets, Dick Coppel and Neil Plumley added control of the backboards and a substantial number of free shots and field goals as Coach Frank Roelandt's gang matched pace with Klamath Falls with a seventh league triumph.

Four in Double
McLaughlin with 17 counters, Coppel with 15 and Plumley with 14 gave Medford four men in double scoring figures, while Larry Henderson, considerably more effective against Medford Saturday than he was on Friday night, was the only one to put in more than eight tallies for the Cavemen. Henderson had 14.

Medford piled up a large portion of its final margin at the free throw line, connecting on 22 of 30 tries for .733 average. Grants Pass fell down at the free stripe, making only 10 of 24 attempts. Coppel shot seven of eight, McLaughlin five of six and Plumley eight of 12 at the gift mark.

The Tornado put in field goals at a .469 clip in the first half. The average lagged in the third quarter as the Tornado played ball control well back from the basket in a bid to draw out the GP defense. But Medford had a commendable .396 standing for the game.

Under the backboards Medford controlled 41 rebounds to 16 by the Cavemen. Coppel claimed 14 retrieves and Plum-

Oregon Tech appeared well on its way to the Oregon Collegiate Conference basketball title today while the Northwest conference race remained wide open. Oregon Tech disposed of defending champion Portland State twice over the weekend, adding a 64-57 win Saturday night to its 51-45 triumph Friday night. The double win gives OTU an 8-2 conference record compared to a 6-4 mark for second place Eastern Oregon.

Southern Oregon hurt Eastern Oregon's title hopes Saturday night with a 77-69 win at La Grande after EOC had won Friday night.

Pacific Wins

Pacific walloped Linfield, 94-79, to move half a game behind the Wildcats for the Northwest lead. Pacific's mark is 5-4 to 5-3 for Linfield. Lewis and Clark moved back into the title picture with a 49-47 win over Willamette. The Pioneers have a 4-4 mark. College of Idaho has a 2-2 record.

Southern Oregon went ahead of the Mounties 30 to 29 in the Saturday night hoop fray at La Grande and kept the lead from there. Score at the half was 36 to 29. The Raiders had their biggest spread at 50 to 37. EOC fired up to cut the count to 51 to 46 midway in the final half and had sliced the deficit to two points at 65 to 63 with three minutes to play. SOC settled down and pulled away from that point.

Bill Hollingsworth had 28 points for Southern Oregon and Gerald Baxter 1-8 for EOC. The Raiders led on the backboards 47 to 35 with Hollingsworth, Dave D'Olivo and Norm Oliva giving them control.

Southern Oregon is now 5-5 in the Oregon Collegiate loop. The Raiders meet Oregon Tech on Wednesday.
